Teleo University partners with our parent organization, T-Net International, to offer degrees to the more than 11,000 pastors and church leaders participating in over 700 training centers in 40 countries in Africa, Asia, and the Americas.



Teleo is a Koine Greek word that means 1) to bring to a close, to finish, or 2) complete or fulfill a command. In the New Testament, the Apostle Paul used Teleo in 2 Timothy 4:7, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race." Again, in John 19:30, as Jesus died on the cross for our salvation, He said, "It is finished." Teleo captures our passion for finishing the Great Commission by being and making disciples of all nations.

In Acts 1:8 and Matthew 28, Jesus told his followers that they would be His witnesses in their cities, their countries, and throughout the whole world until the Great Commission was finished. The **Mission** of T-Net, or Teleo-Network, is to coach pastors and church leaders to *finish* the Great Commission in their congregations, regions, and every country of the world. Finishing the Great Commission in every country of the world so that no nation is unreached is what we call **PROJECT ZERO** because the mandate of "all nations" or "all ethnos" ends at ZERO. Teleo University supports this global initiative by providing affordable, accessible, accredited degrees to pastors and ministry leaders seeking to finish the Great Commission by multiplying disciple makers and initiating saturation church planting.

We believe the Great Commission can and will be *finished*. We believe the whole world will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of God. It is our all-consuming passion to do everything we can, through the power of the Holy Spirit, to see it through. T-Net International is committed to establishing an indigenously led and funded, multiplying, disciple making, church planting, and revitalization movement in each of the more than 230 countries of the world and coaching them until the Great Commission is finished. 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ABOUT TELEO UNIVERSITY

HISTORY AND HERITAGE

The Teleo University story began in **1991** when T-Net International was founded. T-Net's vision started with Bill Hull, a pastor committed to returning his church and others to their disciple making roots. While establishing his church in disciple making, Bill wrote several books showing how the Gospels describe in detail Jesus' method for making disciples and how we can use His approach. Hull brought in church consultant Bob Gilliam to develop the process for instructing churches, and in 1991 T-Net (which then stood for *Training Network*) was born under the umbrella of the Evangelical Free Church of America (EFCA). We look to **1991** as the year of our school's beginning because the core principles and programs we offer now are the same tested and tried principles we have taught for over a quarter of a century.

In 1996 T-Net became an independent, interdenominational, non-profit ministry. In 1998 Bob Gilliam took over as President while Bill Hull returned to pastoral ministry. "As we have progressed over the years," Gilliam says, "we have learned a great deal about what works and what doesn't in helping churches bring people to fullness in Christ." Consequently, the training has been tested and refined over the years to incorporate new insights both from lessons learned in T-Net churches and those gleaned from other ministries.

In **1999** T-Net was invited to India. T-Net has continued to expand its focus beyond US churches to the many nations where T-Net trains pastors who otherwise have limited opportunities for training in Bible study methods and ministry.

In **2012** T-Net's international pastor training center courses were recognized for degrees by a graduate school of theology in Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA. T-Net's course material had long been used for Doctor of Ministry credit by many of the top seminaries in the United States.

In 2018 T-Net founded Teleo University to serve T-Net's over 7300 pastors from 30 countries. Dr. Klopfenstein is leading T-Net and Teleo University to finish the Great Commission in every nation through the **Project Zero** initiative. T-Net will continue to train international pastors to multiply disciple making churches. And Teleo University will offer distance education studies and degrees built upon T-Net's rigorous training program. We follow the principle found in 2 Timothy 2:2, "Teach faithful men who can teach others also" until the Great Commission is finished... **Because the Mandate ENDS AT ZERO.**

MISSION

Our Mission is to provide affordable, accessible, accredited education to pastors and ministry leaders who are seeking to *finish* the Great Commission through multiplying disciple makers and initiating saturation church planting.

DISTINCTIVES

Distance Education for Non-Traditional Students: Pastors that Remain On-the-Job

Teleo University plays a unique role in Theological Education by Extension. Teleo University's focus is on *finishing* the Great Commission of Jesus (Matthew 28:19-20) in each nation of the world by empowering indigenous pastors and church leaders. Teleo University only seeks students who are currently pastors, church planters, or key lay leaders. The average age of these non-traditional students is between 30 to 55 years old. These Christian leaders do not need to leave their ministries and families to attend classes. Teleo University offers no resident campus learning. Instead, students must remain in their local church ministry to implement what they learn in this unique distance education program.

Teleo University is not in competition with traditional Bible Colleges and Seminaries. Teleo University's core materials have been taught at a master's and doctoral level by several of the most prominent evangelical seminaries: Bethel Seminary, Columbia International University, Dallas Theological Seminary, Trinity Divinity School, Western Theological Seminary, West Africa Theological Seminary, and more.

Teleo University professors share their knowledge with students through a cross-culturally tested curriculum, printed lectures, and, more recently, web-based video coaching (currently English only). The course curriculum is translated into multiple languages. Therefore, Teleo University employs correspondence courses where students meet their professors only through printed lectures and perhaps video coaching, but without personal interaction. However, our print delivery, supported by local study groups and experienced facilitators, empowers our students to receive practical theological education without leaving their ministry or network of relationships.

By gathering students into study groups called T-Net Training Centers, students benefit from carefully prepared study materials, collaboration with fellow students, and facilitators who have studied and applied this curriculum in their ministries. Furthermore, the Internet now offers more resources and allows student exposer to instructors, course authors, and subject matter experts through video coaching.

Trained as Trainers-The Disciple Making Model

Teleo University students participate in local study groups called T-Net Training Centers to complete assignments and enjoy vibrant student life interaction. Teleo University requires that pastors learn as students and then apply what they learn by leading, training, and implementing it in their local churches. Finally, every student must take on the disciple making mindset of training other pastors and church leaders (2 Timothy 2:2). Within the T-Net Training Centers, students form training teams to fulfill teaching practicum requirements of training this material to other pastors and church leaders.

INSTITUTIONAL GOALS

To accomplish our mission, Teleo University seeks to...

- 1. Keep the cost of education accessible to all students regardless of their financial means.
- 2. Provide students with learning resources adequate to meet the learning objectives of every study program.
- 3. Provide students with accredited degrees and certificates.
- 4. Complement not compete with existing Bible Colleges and Seminaries.
- 5. Recruit and train existing pastors and church leaders so they need not leave their current ministry positions but can apply their learning in their churches.
- 6. Make finishing the Great Commission the primary objective of all training programs.
- 7. Training students to revitalize local churches as disciple making churches.
- 8. Empower students as trainers and equippers who multiply disciple making training and saturation church planting to finish the Great Commission.

VALUES

Teleo University's core values define the character of the institution. Through our commitment to these values, we preserve that which has made Teleo University effective in accomplishing our unique mission:

- Applied Learning: Requiring students to have an on-the-job training context so that pastors and church leaders apply their knowledge in real-life ministry.
- Excellence in Training: Providing uniquely practical and useful training that is of the highest quality possible.
- **Revitalizing Churches** Training church leaders to effectively make **changes** in local churches resulting in measurable life change in individual church members.
- Sequential Disciple Making: Training church leaders to use a phased biblical definition of a disciple that includes "AII" the beliefs, values, behaviors that Jesus commanded.
- **Trainer Practitioners:** Utilizing faculty and study group facilitators who are experienced pastors that have implemented the principles of disciple making that they teach.
- Train to Finish: Training pastors not just to work at it but to "finish" the Great Commission in their specific neighborhood, city, region, or country.
- Transferability: Providing training that is transferable and multiplied from leader to leader and from church to church.
- Whole-Church Disciple Making: Training pastors and church leaders to use every ministry in their church to work together to produce the disciple Jesus intended.

INSTITUTIONAL LEARNING OUTCOMES

A student completing a degree from Teleo University will

- 1. **Spiritual Formation:** Continue to grow as a Christian, cultivating ethical values and a life of personal integrity, personally and as a pastor, and learning to maintain life balance with Christ as Lord of all areas of life.
- 2. **Great Commission:** Focus their life and ministry on *finishing* the Great Commission within defined areas and regions.
- 3. **Pastoral Leadership:** Implement an intentional disciple making "philosophy of ministry" for the local church and develop the skills and knowledge required to be an effective disciple making pastoral leader who equips lay leaders, church planters, and fellow pastors (2 Timothy 2:2).
- 4. **Bible Knowledge and Doctrine:** Know how to study the Bible to think biblically and theologically and teach others to do so.
- 5. **Communication:** Develop speaking, writing, reading, and interpersonal skills to communicate the Gospel and the love of Christ.
- 6. **Cross-Cultural Awareness:** As a Christian, learn how to recognize, appreciate, and engage other cultures within their region, country, and the world.

STATEMENT OF FAITH

Teleo University is an Evangelical Protestant religious organization that holds to the essentials of biblical orthodoxy. The following statement addresses seven essentials upon which Christians have agreed throughout the centuries. These statements are inclusive rather than exclusive. We are eager to partner with denominations, churches, and

other religious organizations that embrace the Christian faith's essentials. To maintain continuity and consistency, Teleo University expects faculty, administration, and students to agree with, personally adhere to, and support the following doctrinal statement:

We Believe:

- 1. The Scriptures, both Old, and New Testaments, to be the inspired Word of God, without error in the original writings, the complete revelation of His will for the salvation of men and women and the Divine and final authority for Christian faith practice.
- 2. In one God, creator of all things, infinitely perfect and eternally existing in three persons–Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
- 3. That Jesus Christ is true God and true man having been conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He died on the cross as a sacrifice for our sins, according to the Scriptures. Further, He arose bodily from the dead, ascended into heaven, where at the right hand of the Majesty on High, He is now our High Priest and Advocate.
- The ministry of the Holy Spirit is to glorify the Lord Jesus Christ, and during this age, to convict men and women, regenerate the believing sinner, and indwell, guide, instruct, and empower the believer for godly living and service.
- 5. That mankind was created in the image of God but fell into sin and is, therefore, lost and only through regeneration by the Holy Spirit can salvation and spiritual life be obtained.
- 6. That the shed blood of Jesus Christ and His resurrection provide the only ground for justification and salvation for all who believe. That the new birth comes only by grace through faith in Christ alone and that repentance is a vital part of believing, but is in no way in itself a separate and independent condition of salvation; nor are any other acts such as confession, baptism, prayer, or faithful service to be added to believing as a condition of salvation.
- 7. In the bodily resurrection of the dead; of the believer to everlasting blessedness and joy with the Lord; of the unbeliever to judgment and everlasting conscious punishment.

TELEO UNIVERSITY MINNEAPOLIS, MINNESOTA

Teleo University is a global distance educational institution headquartered in Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA. Teleo University does not offer nor require resident campus classroom learning at our Minneapolis location. Instead, students access the courses through printed manuals and from web resources.

THE SCHOOLS OF TELEO UNIVERSITY

Teleo University's focus is to equip local pastors to revitalize their churches as disciple making churches, multiplying leaders, and developing church planters who will seek to finish the Great Commission in their churches, neighborhoods, regions, and countries. Because of our singular focus of finishing the Great Commission, we offer a limited number of programs and degrees. We specifically avoid offering the many ministry preparation degrees commonly available at other Bible Colleges and Seminaries. Instead, we seek to complement what they offer by providing our unique and focused disciple making training for those currently serving as pastors and church leaders. The following is a list of the general objectives we hold for all students in every program:

- Implement an intentional disciple making "philosophy of ministry" for the local church
- Maintain life balance and personal integrity with Christ as Lord of all areas of life
- Develop the skills and knowledge required to be an effective pastoral leader
- Sustain a pattern of developing lay leaders, church planters, and fellow pastors
- · Focus life and ministry on finishing the Great Commission within defined areas and regions
- · Think biblically and improved preaching and written communication skills
- Develop a hunger for life-long learning and personal development

Teleo University includes three schools in the United States: The T-Net School of Ministry for ministry certification, the T-Net School of Theology for undergraduate studies, and the Graduate School of Ministry for master's and doctorate degrees. Teleo University also has T-Net International School of Theology authorized as an administrative extension education center in Singapore.

T-Net School of Ministry (Certification Programs)

The mission of the T-Net School of Ministry is to provide practical Bible-centered ministry training to church planters and pastors who are seeking to finish the Great Commission in their targeted locale and affirm their training through certification.

T-Net School of Theology (Undergraduate Programs)

T-Net School of Theology offers two diploma programs and a Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry degree that meets United States Department of Education (USDE) guidelines and state Office of Higher Education requirements. Students

seeking this Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry (BPM) program must complete a year of general studies (30 semester credits) in addition to the core BPM courses. Teleo University does not offer the required bachelor's degree general education courses but welcomes the transfer of these general education credits from partner schools and other institutions. T-Net International School of Theology – Singapore (BPM and GDip Programs)

T-Net International School of Theology, Singapore, offers two programs. First, a Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry to students who do not live in the United States. This degree is designed to meet the international accreditation standards employed by Asia Theological Association and does not require the 30 credit hours of general education. Second, TISOT offers a Graduate Diploma in Church Growth based on the T-Net Tier 2 curriculum.

T-Net Graduate School of Ministry (Graduate Degree Programs)

The mission of the T-Net Graduate School of Ministry is to provide graduate degree education to pastors and church leaders. The programs guide pastors to revitalize their current congregations as disciple making churches and mobilize them to coach a growing network of pastors to finish the Great Commission.

ADMISSION POLICIES

GENERAL ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Students admitted to Teleo University are chosen based on spirituality, ministry zeal, academic ability, and their current role as a pastor, Bishop, church planter, church leader, or spouse. Teleo University is an educational institution for those non-traditional students who are already in vocational or bi-vocational pastoral ministry and church leadership. Teleo University provides Theological Education by Extension through a correspondence curriculum facilitated in T-Net Training Centers' study groups. Teleo University expects all students to participate in a T-Net Training Center study group.

Certificate Programs Admission Requirements

- 1. (United States residents) A high school diploma representing the successful completion of 12 years of schooling.
- 2. (Non-US residents) Completion of 10 years of schooling or demonstrated ability to study at this level.
- 3. An applicant must be active in *ministry and authorized to implement assignments within a local church. *Active in Ministry typically is reflected by the following roles: Senior Pastor, Associate/Assistant Pastor, Church Planter, Elder/Church Leader, Pastor's Spouse.

Diploma Programs Admission Requirements

- 1. (United States residents) A high school diploma representing the successful completion of 12 years of schooling.
- 2. (Non-US residents) Completion of 10 years of schooling or demonstrated ability to study at this level.
- 3. An applicant must be active in *ministry and authorized to implement assignments within a local church. *Active in Ministry typically is reflected by the following roles: Senior Pastor, Associate/Assistant Pastor, Church Planter, Elder/Church Leader, Pastor's Spouse.

Bachelor's Degree Programs Admission Requirements

- 1. Successful completion of 12 years of schooling or its equivalent.
- 2. In exceptional cases, mature candidates (aged 30 and above with at least five years of ministry experience) who have not completed the prerequisite schooling may be admitted on a probationary status based on the Recognition of Prior Learning Policy.
- 3. An applicant must be active in *ministry and authorized to implement assignments within a local church.

 *Active in Ministry typically is reflected by the following roles: Senior Pastor, Associate/Assistant Pastor, Church Planter, Elder/Church Leader, Pastor's Spouse, Bishop or Denominational Leader.
- 4. (United States residents general education requirements) Teleo University does not offer the required bachelor's degree general education courses but welcomes the transfer of these general education credits from partner schools and other institutions. For more information, refer to the Transfer of Credits Policy and General Studies Policy. There are two options to meet the general education requirements:
 - Option 1: Transfer credits previously earned from other institutions.
 - Option 2: Take the required 30 semester credits of general studies while completing the pastoral ministry program.

Graduate Diploma in Church Growth Program Admission Requirements

- 1. Continued involvement as a facilitator for a T-Net Training Center (study group).
- 2. Successful completion of the prerequisite Teleo Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry degree.
- 3. Mature candidates (30 and above) who have not completed the prerequisite Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry degree may apply after the successful and exemplary completion of the Certificate or Diploma of Pastoral Ministry.

Master of Divinity Program Admission Requirements

- 1. Successful completion of a bachelor's degree or its equivalent from an accredited or recognized school.
- 2. In extraordinary cases, mature candidates (aged 30 and above with at least five years of ministry experience) who have not completed the prerequisite degree may be admitted on a probationary status based on the Recognition of Prior Learning Policy.
- 3. An applicant must be active in *ministry and authorized to implement assignments within a local church. *Active in Ministry typically is reflected by the following roles: Senior Pastor, Associate/Assistant Pastor, Church Planter, Elder/Church Leader, Pastor's Spouse.

Master of Ministry in Church Growth Program Admission Requirements

- 1. Continued involvement as a facilitator for a T-Net Training Center (study group).
- 2. Successful completion of the prerequisite Teleo Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry degree.
 - ✓ Your T-Net Training Center students have multiplied to at least 2 centers or 2 times the number of students
 - ✓ Submit the BPM 15-20 page written Field Project Report.

Doctor of Ministry Program Admission Requirements

- 1. A minimum of five years of experience in ministry is required.
- 2. Continued involvement as a facilitator for a T-Net Training Center (study group).
- 3. Successful completion of the Teleo University Master of Divinity degree.
 - ✓ Your T-Net Training Center students have multiplied to at least 2 centers or 2 times the number of students
 - ✓ Submit the BPM 15-20 page written Field Project Report.

SPIRITUAL REQUIREMENTS: BELIEF AND CHARACTER

Applicants must agree with, personally adhere to, and support Teleo University's Doctrinal Statement. By completing and signing the application, the applicant promises to respect and comply with the student standards of conduct of Teleo University. Applicants are to give evidence of Christian character and maintain a lifestyle consistent with biblical standards of a daily walk with Christ. Teleo University serves students in many cultures worldwide, and we acknowledge that some practices will be considered acceptable by Christians in one culture but not another. Therefore, Teleo University insists that the Scriptures guide godly conduct for both students and faculty. Where Scripture is clear, we will be clear, but where it is not, there will be freedom and grace.

CHRISTIAN SERVICE REQUIREMENTS

Serving is an integral part of the Christian life. Students enrolled in Teleo University are non-traditional students serving as pastors, church planters, and Christian leaders in the local church. Christian service is not something added to the coursework. It is integrated into the entire educational experience at Teleo University at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. Serving and loving non-Christians and helping disciples grow is a way of life for those seeking to finish the Great Commission.

ADMISSIONS PROCESS

Step 1: Join a T-Net Training Center Study Group

As a distance education institution, Teleo University does not offer traditional classroom education. Teleo University expects all students to participate in a local study group facilitated by T-Net International, where students collaborate with group members and complete directed instructional activities. Step 2: Submit the Application, Fee, Three Recommendations, and Transcripts

Applicants must submit the following items through their T-Net Training Center study group facilitator in their country or directly to the Office of Admissions if so directed:

- Admission Application: Begin the application process by completing the online application at
 www.teleuniversity.org or submitting a paper application to your T-Net Training Center study group facilitator in
 your country. Click on the "Admissions" tab at www.teleouniversity.org to find the online application and
 instructions.
- 2. **Application Fee:** Submit the \$50 (USD) non-refundable application fee through your T-Net Training Center study group facilitator, or for further assistance, contact admissions@teleouniversity.org.
- 3. **Acknowledge Agreement:** Affirm agreement with Teleo University's Statement of Faith and agree to abide by the school's policies and program requirements by checking the appropriate boxes on page two of the application form.
- 4. **Recommendations:** Teleo University requires three recommendation forms for all new applicants. Provide the following forms to the appropriate references. Have your references scan and email the completed forms to admission@teleouniversity.org or have them return the recommendation forms to your T-Net Training Center facilitator to submit to Teleo University along with your application and other required documents.
 - Recommendation 1: T-Net Training Center Trainer-Facilitator.
 - Recommendation 2: Personal Reference.
 - Recommendation 3: Ministry Reference.
- 5. **Transcript Evaluation:** Secondary school (high school), college, or university transcripts must be evaluated and reviewed for eligibility when you apply. The evaluation confirms if the student qualifies to begin the program for which the student has applied. To submit transcripts for evaluation:
 - Option 1: If your previous school offers official electronic (secure PDF) transcripts, this will be your fastest
 method. Request that your school send a copy to admissions@TeleoUniversity.org
 - Option 2: Submit a valid copy of your official transcript(s): 1) scan (PDF only) and upload the transcript document(s) when completing an online application, or 2) provide the transcript document(s) to your T-Net Training Center facilitator for document upload, or 3) email the scanned (PDF only) transcript document(s) directly to admissions@teleouniversity.org.
 - Option 3: (USA only) If mailing a hard copy is the only option offered, have your official transcript sent to:

Step 3: Receive a Notice of Acceptance

After Teleo University has received and processed your application fee and required documents, the admission office will send the applicant a notice of acceptance or non-admission. The admissions department will recommend an appropriate alternative program for students who do not qualify for requested program.

Step 4: Access Your Student Account

Using the "My Teleo" section of TeleoUniversity.org, access your Teleo University student online account.

Step 5: Pay Your Tuition and Proceed Through the Program

Teleo University enrolls students in prescribed programs of 9 or 10 four-month consecutive academic terms (36 or 40 months). There is no need to register for each term because of automatic enrollment for each term's prescribed courses. If you pay your tuition and earn passing grades, you will proceed automatically from one term to the next throughout the program.

RECOGNITION OF PREVIOUS LEARNING POLICY

Teleo University is proud to serve evangelicals in dozens of countries on multiple continents. This international context introduces a variety of formal higher education models and non-formal and informal learning that requires assessment. Therefore, Teleo University offers the following policy for evaluating non-formal and informal prior learning for students living outside of the United States.

Previous Learning Defined

- 1. Previous or prior learning may include formal, non-formal, or informal learning in any of the following:
 - Relevant courses or programs completed as a student at another institution of learning where the faculty teaching these courses or programs meet the Teleo Universities accrediting association standards.
 - Relevant courses taught for at least five years as faculty in another institution of learning.
 - Substantial ministry experience of at least five years, whether in full-time pastoral ministry, cross-cultural ministry, or church planting ministry. For church planting ministry to be considered for credit, the ministry should have resulted in a congregation with founders, leaders, and regular members, with at least five years' continuous operations. The congregation may or may not have a church building.
- 2. For a whole variety of reasons, candidates may apply to study without formal educational qualifications. Many people have been severely affected by war, political instability, persecution, poverty, or natural disaster. Their formal education was interrupted or impossible.

Admissions Procedures and Considerations for Previous Learning

- 1. Applicants may receive special consideration when they meet most of the Teleo University entrance requirements but not formal educational qualifications. For example, the applicant:
 - Has not completed the necessary years of formal schooling.
 - Does not have a bachelor's degree to enter a master's program.
 - Is unable to show any evidence of their academic achievement.
- 2. The Office of Admissions for Teleo University may choose to allow such applicants to enter the program on probation. Considering our unique mission and vision, Teleo University accepts the responsibility of evaluating and giving special consideration to unique applicants' history, qualifications, and experience.
- 3. Guidelines for admission to study on probation include:
 - The applicant is a mature student of at least thirty years of age
 - The applicant meets the other entrance requirements for the program
 - The applicant has at least five years of ministry experience relevant to the program, e.g., pastoral, teaching, church planting, or cross-cultural ministry.
- 4. Students admitted on probation must demonstrate acceptable grades and effective collaboration with other members of their study group for a three terms (one year) study.

Credits Awarded for Previous Learning

Credits awarded for any type of previous learning may only be applied to the 15 credits of independent study required for the TISOT Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry degree program for students living outside of the United States.

NOTICE OF NONDISCRIMINATION POLICY

Teleo University, in its employment, educational, and admissions policies, does not discriminate by race, color, gender, nationality, age, disability, or ethnic origin.

POLICY AND PROVISION FOR FEMALE STUDENTS

Teleo University is proud to serve all evangelical denominations in training pastors and church leaders to finish the Great Commission. Our doctrinal statement is intentionally inclusive. It states what Christians have believed through the centuries around the world. Most denominations offer more detailed statements on specific doctrines, but Teleo University only requires agreement on these essentials.

Denominations and churches often hold different views on women in ministry, but Teleo University does not impose either view on students or denominational partners.

- Complementarian: This view generally teaches that while women are created with equal value to men in the eyes
 of God, they have been delegated a different role in the church that does not allow them to teach or to exercise
 authority over adult males.
- Egalitarian: This view generally teaches that, in the church, women are free to teach and exercise authority and serve in precisely the same way as men.

Policy Statement: All female pastors, evangelists, church planters, and spouses who desire to enroll in Teleo University, whether complementarian or egalitarian, will be allowed to do so. Provisions have been made within the curriculum and assignments to accommodate female students from denominations or churches that hold a complementarian position or whose cultural context limits them.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

Special need-based scholarships are available for students in the United States. The amount of the award is based on the student's financial need. In keeping with the institution's mission, special consideration is provided for recent immigrants to North America. Students in countries outside of the USA pay tuition based on each country.

FINANCIAL AID AND STUDY LOANS

Teleo University is opposed to students borrowing money to pay for tuition. Therefore, Teleo University does not participate in any student loan programs, private or public.

CANCELATION AND REFUND POLICY

Teleo University strives to provide the best in training material and instruction for pastors. It makes every effort to inform students about the course content that students will receive. However, if a student finds it necessary to withdraw from a Teleo University course, the following policy will apply:

- 1. No refunds are issued after five (5) business days for the application fee
- 2. No refund of tuition is issued after receiving the course manual or attending session one of a course
- 3. All Teleo University registration, administration, and graduation fees are non-refundable

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

CREDIT HOUR DEFINITION

Teleo University records credits in semester hours. A semester credit hour is 45 learning hours of instructor-designated activities or academic engagement for each semester hour credit. A learning hour is 50 minutes of any learning activity appropriate to the academic award offered and 10 minutes of break time. Therefore, each credit hour represents 2,250 minutes (or 37.5 sixty-minute hours) of academic engagement. The one exception is the T-Net International School of Theology (TISOT) programs based in Singapore, which require 40 learning hours or 2,000 minutes of academic engagement for each semester credit.

Field Ministry courses and Independent Studies are graded as "P" pass or "F" fail and do not affect the student's grade point average (GPA).

Minimum Grade Requirements

Some essential course material is presented to all the pastors and church leaders regardless of degree level. However, each degree requires different levels of academic mastery and ministry implementation for grading. To pass a course, a student must earn a course grade and an exam grade at the following level for the degree:

- Certificate, diploma, and bachelor's degree students must earn a course and exam grade of "C" or higher.
- Master's and doctoral degree students must earn a course and exam grade of "B" or higher.

Academic Honors

Academic awards are based on a student's cumulative GPA. The following guidelines are used to determine academic honors:

Posting of Official Grades

Official student grades and course reports are required to be posted fourteen (14) calendar days after the course's last day. Students can view their official grades through their "My Teleo" online access.

ACADEMIC POLICIES

The following policies govern the granting of diplomas and degrees:

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY POLICY

In the spirit of truth and honesty as espoused by our Lord Jesus Christ, Teleo University seeks to maintain an atmosphere where high ethical standards prevail. Teleo University condemns academic dishonesty. Behavior such as cheating, plagiarizing, or data fabrication will result in disciplinary action and possible dismissal from the program.

THEOLOGICAL INTEGRITY POLICY

Teleo University requires that all students and trainers affirm their agreement with the school's doctrinal statement.

TRANSFER OF CREDITS POLICY

Transfer of credits refers to granting credits to a student for courses completed at another institution. Because of the unique nature of Teleo University programs, the school provides transcripts for graduates of completed programs but does not provide documentation for the transfer of specific courses. Teleo University offers programs that require students to complete the entire scope and sequence of the courses included in those programs. Therefore, the school does not accept transfer credits in place of any program courses with two exceptions for bachelor's degrees:

Bachelor's Degree General Studies Courses (United States Residents)

University does not offer the required 30 credit hours of general education undergraduate instruction but welcomes the transfer of these general education credits from partner schools and other institutions. Teleo University offers the remaining 90 credit hours leading to a bachelor's degree. Teleo University, in general, accepts transfer course credit from other institutions of higher education under the following conditions:

- The subject matter and the course level must align with Teleo University's General Studies Policy.
- The grade for the course must be at least a C- or its equivalent.
- Course credit earned at an institution of higher education is transferable based on one of the following criteria: 1) authorized by the state office of higher education, and 2) a member of a USDE-CHEA recognized accreditation body as a degree-granting institution, or 3) independent validation of the institution by Teleo University.
- Students may transfer up to 30 semester hours of general education toward a bachelor's degree program.
- A student must complete the 90 credit hour Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry program to earn their bachelor's degree.
- Grades for courses transferred from other institutions are received as pass/fail and not included in calculating the student grade point average for Teleo University.

International Bachelor's Degree (Students Living Outside the USA)

Through T-Net International School of Theology, Singapore, Teleo University offers the 120 credit hour Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry degree program for pastors and church leaders who live outside of the United States. For this degree, a credit hour representing 40 learning hours or 2,000 minutes of academic engagement for each semester credit. The core courses of the Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry program account for 105 credits. Therefore, students must secure 15 semester credit hours beyond the core courses through independent study or transfer credits. For the TISOT Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry, Teleo University accepts transfer course credit from other institutions of higher education under the following conditions:

- The grade for the course must be at least a C- or its equivalent.
- Course credit earned at an institution of higher education in another country is transferable based on one of the following criteria: 1) recognition by their Ministry of Education or an accreditation body as a degree-granting institution, or 2) independent validation of the institution by Teleo University.
- Students may transfer up to 15 semester hours toward the bachelor's degree program.
- A student must complete the 105 credit hour Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry program to earn their bachelor's degree.
- Grades for courses transferred from other institutions are received as pass/fail and not included in calculating the student grade point average for Teleo University.

GENERAL STUDIES POLICY

Bachelor's degrees granted in the United States typically require a minimum of one year of general education studies. Some undergraduate transfer students will have completed their general studies at a two-year community college or secular university. However, because most of our students are currently serving as pastors, many will be transferring from Bible Colleges where they experienced integrating biblical and general studies. This integration provides exposure to a breadth of subjects but allows students to evaluate them from a biblical worldview. Developing the ability to biblically assess and analyze concepts and philosophical issues presented in general studies is beneficial for pastors and Christian leaders. Consider the following policy statement:

General studies or general education requirements imply a broad exposure to diverse subject areas from several disciplines. T-Net School of Theology does not offer general studies. Still, it follows the Minnesota Office of Higher Education guidelines and requirements in evaluating the transcripts of undergraduate students transferring credits to Teleo University:

Bachelor degree programs should include a minimum of 45 quarter or 30-semester credits distributed across at least the following four areas. Included in the 45 (quarter) or 30 (semester) credits should be at least 6 (quarter) or 4 (semester) credits in each of the four fields of study. Select the remaining general education credits from one or more of these four categories (the typical distribution of credits is listed below):

- Communication 9 credits (e.g., composition, public speaking, writing courses)
- Humanities/Fine Arts 9 credits (e.g., modern and classical languages, history, literature, linguistics, philosophy, archaeology, art, music, graphics)
- Natural Science/Mathematics 6 credits (e.g., physical science, biology/life science, physics, chemistry, mathematics, statistics)
- · Social/Behavioral Sciences 6 credits (e.g., psychology, sociology, anthropology, political science)

The examples provided are only illustrative. Courses from other disciplines may be used to meet the general studies requirements if they fit naturally into one of the four areas. Transcripts are evaluated accordingly. Teleo applies two limitations in transcript evaluation for General Studies Policy requirements:

- 1. Courses that qualify as biblical/theological studies, although having general education value in other contexts, do not qualify as general studies within biblical higher education.
- A course with three prerequisites does not qualify as general studies. The course is too specialized to be classified as "general studies."

ATTENDANCE POLICIES FOR STUDENTS

As a distance education institution, Teleo University does not offer traditional classroom education. Participation is defined differently for distance learning. Teleo University expects all students to participate in a local study group facilitated by T-Net International, where students collaborate with group members and complete directed instructional activities. We measure student attendance for courses by **active participation** as described in the individual course.

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS AND SATISFACTORY PROGRESS

The passing grades in courses are:

- For a certificate—an average letter grade of "C" or higher for every course
- For undergraduate studies (Diploma or Bachelor's)-an average letter grade of "C" or higher for every course
- For graduate studies (Master's or Doctorate)—an average letter grade of "B" or higher for every course
- Course assignments that fail to earn a passing grade are marked "incomplete" or "warning" and cannot be
 used to satisfy any of the requirements of graduation

CATALOG USE

Students are responsible for fulfilling their academic program's requirements as documented in the catalog for the academic year they were admitted, readmitted, or declared their program.

A student who re-enters a Teleo University program after an absence of two or more years must meet the current program's requirements as documented in the catalog for that academic year unless he or she receives written approval. This written permission must be approved and filed with the Dean's office before the student re-enters the program.

APPEAL FOR CHANGE OF GRADE

A student may appeal for a change of grade when they believe there was an error in computing the student's final grade for a course or that they were graded unfairly. The student must initiate the change by contacting the instructor within two months after the grade posting. If the issue cannot be resolved between the student and the instructor, the student must appeal to the Dean within four months of the grade posting. After four months, the grade is considered final, and the student cannot appeal the grade.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITY

Students are responsible for knowing degree requirements, participating in the courses offered, and completing all necessary assignments that will enable them to finish their degree or diploma program. It is also the student's responsibility to know Teleo University's ethical expectations for students and regulations for the standard of work required to continue in the program.

FORMS AND REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

To be eligible to graduate, the following forms and requirements must be submitted and completed:

- 1. Submit the Teleo Application for Graduation filled out and signed by the student.
- 2. Pay the graduation fee of \$50.00 and have no outstanding tuition or fee payments.
- 3. Continued display of Christian character and service in ministry.
- 4. Maintain a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 for undergraduate (diplomas and bachelor's degrees); and 3.0 for graduate (master's or doctoral degrees).
- 5. Be recommended by the faculty of the university and the registrar.

STUDENT SERVICES

STUDENT LIFE

Character and Conduct

Teleo University trains pastors and church leaders who are currently serving in ministry. Paul declares that those leading the church must be blameless and above reproach (Titus 1:6-7). In 1 Timothy 3:2-3, Paul further states, *Now the overseer is to be above reproach, faithful to his wife, temperate, self-controlled, respectable, hospitable, able to teach, not given to drunkenness, not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome, not a lover of money.* Therefore, Teleo University holds these same expectations of biblical conduct for our students. Teleo University allows freedom of behavior where the Bible permits freedom and expects restraint, where the Bible gives clear commands. As church leaders and disciple makers, Teleo students should avoid every appearance of dishonesty, deception, lack of integrity, immorality, abusive speech, and impropriety.

Mentoring and Accountability

Teleo University recognizes that disciple making is a life-on-life relational experience. Therefore, Teleo seeks to ensure that every student has two supportive relationships during their time as a student. First, Teleo aims to connect each student with a mentor who has previously completed the same course of study and has successfully implemented the required assignments. Secondly, students are placed in peer accountability partnerships with fellow students to provide academic and personal life support and accountability.

Community Life

Teleo University is a distance learning institution that values vital Christian fellowship. Therefore, students are required to apply their learning in the context of relationships. Students fulfill assignments within their local church. They do so through one-on-one mentoring, small group disciple making and leadership equipping, mid-size group fellowships, and whole-church gatherings. However, it is vital that church leaders also connect with peers. Therefore, Teleo University connects students in face-to-face study groups whenever possible or assigns a mentor if no study group is available. The primary way students enjoy this community life is by participating in a T-Net Training Center "study group" near their home or church. T-Net Training Center study groups are not official classrooms taught by faculty. They are a cohort of pastors and church leaders seeking to learn and implement the essential principles of Teleo University programs. Program graduates or advanced students facilitate these T-Net Training Center study groups. Participants benefit from a fixed schedule, facilitated discussions, and collaboration with other pastors who share their goals and values.

LEARNING AND EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES

Teleo University is a global distance education institution. Therefore, we have no campus with classrooms, housing, dining, or a physical library. Our digital learning resources are all located through the www.teleouniversity.org website or the "My Teleo" online campus management student portal. Teleo University also seeks to establish student access to library resources in each language and country where students participate in local study groups.

T-NET SCHOOL OF MINISTRY

T-Net School of Ministry certificates are for individuals who desire Teleo University's practical pastoral leadership training but do not need academic credit for their studies or do not meet the prerequisites to receive academic credit. Therefore, T-Net School of Ministry programs earn no formal academic credit. However, these certification programs are often recognized by denominations, church networks, and governments as approved pastoral training for ordination and ministerial credentials.

CERTIFICATE IN CHRISTIAN MINISTRY (CCM)

Program Description

The Certificate in Christian Ministry (CCM) is for lay leaders who are currently serving in a church who desire to increase their effectiveness in impacting their city, region, or people group with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Students will learn to lead model sequential disciple making small groups. They will launch an outreach small group in their community and multiply new outreach groups by apprenticing new group leaders. From this homegroup network, they will grow their church or form a new church plant. Students will improve their Bible study skills, leadership development, evangelism, Bible teaching, and church organization.

Program Outcomes

Students who complete the requirements for this program will have met the following objectives:

- 1. Experience an intentional disciple making philosophy of ministry for the local church
- 2. Experience personal transformation and spiritual formation as a disciple who seeks to make disciples
- 3. Develop skills in Bible study methods and Bible teaching
- 4. Develop the skills and knowledge required to be an effective pastoral leader
- 5. Gain knowledge and skill in directing sequential disciple making with or within small groups
- 6. Multiply ministry by training and developing lay leaders as group leaders and church planters
- 7. Learn to organize a homegroup network into an intentional disciple making church

Admission Requirements

- 1) (United States residents) A high school diploma representing the successful completion of 12 years of schooling.
- 2) (Non-US residents) Completion of 10 years of schooling or demonstrated ability to study at this level.
- 3) An applicant must be active in *ministry and authorized to implement assignments within a local church. *Active in Ministry typically is reflected by the following roles: Senior Pastor, Associate/Assistant Pastor, Church Planter, Elder/Church Leader, Pastor's Spouse.

Graduation Requirements

The student passes an assessment of his or her achievement of the graduate profile for this award, including:

- 1) Successful completion of 30 credit hours.
- 2) Successful completion of field education/Practical Ministry Assignments.
- 3) Model of the Student Life Character and Conduct and mastery of the Institutional Learning Outcomes.

Program Structure and Delivery

Students participate in this program year-round by completing three 16-week terms each year for 9 terms. Students are independent learners but participate in regularly scheduled study groups called T-Net Training Centers led by experienced facilitators.

BIBLE AND THEOLOGY DIVISION

BT111 Introduction to Finishing the Great Commission (2 credits)

The course defines what finishing the Great Commission looks like and provides a strategy to equip students to finish it in their lifetime. It also suggests a biblical approach to fund this effort. The course provides a study of the Great Commission and introduces how Jesus made disciples in training phases. Students learn how to train disciple making leaders in a model discipleship small group. Students also learn to lead their churches to increase commitment and financial stewardship. They learn to recruit the next-generation bi-vocational pastors, church planters, and church leaders that the students can train on their own or as part of a training team.

BT122 Bible Study Methods (4 credits)

In this course, students will complete the manual Bible Study Methods manual. Students will learn how to use Bible student methods as the foundation for developing strong, biblical-based messages. They will also learn how to use the Bible Study Methods manual to teach church leaders and church members how to study and interpret the Bible correctly.

BT213 Teaching Survey of Bible and Doctrine (4 credits)

Students will learn how to teach and train others to teach the Bible and doctrine to their congregation using mid-sized group teaching skills in this course. The course introduces various effective teaching methods and provides lesson resources for teaching a survey of Bible books and essential Bible doctrines. As a result of this course, students will become more effective at teaching and have trained small group and mid-sized group leaders to teach essential Bible doctrines and an overview of the whole Bible to their groups.

CHURCH MINISTRIES DIVISION

MINISTRY LEADERSHIP (ML)

ML121 Making and Multiplying Disciples (2 credits)

Students learn how to apprentice lay leaders to become effective small group disciple making leaders and plant house churches. Students will also learn how to find persons of peace and plant Discovery Bible Study Groups in cultural pockets of people different from their church. Further, students learn to manage a network of Discovery Bible Study "house churches" and transform multiple DBS groups into mid-sized churches.

ML212 Church Leader Training (Part 1) (4 credits)

In this course, students will learn to create foundational documents for a church: Purpose Statement, Doctrinal Statement, Target Statement, and Vision Statement. Students will learn practical lessons for disciple making in churches of different sizes and structures. They will learn how to apprentice Outreach Come and See group leaders as potential church planters. Finally, students learn the components of a Be with Me Discovery Bible Study and how to lead one.

ML213 Church Leader Training (Part 2) (4 credits)

In this course, students learn to organize and lead a church. Topics in this course include evangelistic strategies to attract seekers, preventing church splits, multiplying groups, developing a budget, and financial strategy. Additional

topics include legal issues, promotional strategy, overcoming attendance drop-off, equipping and empowering leaders, staffing for growth, and launching church plants.

ML214 Sustaining Disciple Makers (4 credits)

The course teaches how to multiply new groups for your whole congregation through apprenticing leaders and how to provide ongoing support for disciple making group leaders through a Ministry Community. Students will experience the workshop, Steps to Freedom in Christ, and learn how to facilitate this for their congregation. Finally, students will learn the principles of church growth.

PASTORAL MINISTRY (PM)

PM111 Evangelism and Outreach (3 credits)

Students learn practical evangelism tools to train disciple makers and church planters to share the gospel effectively. The course teaches students how to write their faith story, share the gospel personally, and work as a group to introduce people to Jesus Christ in a friendly, positive manner. Students learn to launch and lead an expanding network of Outreach Come and See Discovery Bible Studies. Students will also learn how to apprentice a person of peace to lead an Outreach Come and See Discovery Bible Study group. Students also learn to use *the Disciple Making Small Group Leader Training* apprentice manual to equip their leaders further.

PM112 Come and See Disciple Making (3 credits)

In this course, students will complete the manual Disciple Making Small Group Leader Training. They will learn the essential dynamics and principles of leading a disciple making small group and be prepared to lead and launch disciple making small groups in the local church so that members grow from one spiritual phase to the next. This course also includes *Steps Toward Spiritual Growth*. This essential discipling tool has twelve sessions focused on helping move Christians toward spiritual growth and maturity by introducing them to the essential elements of spiritual understanding and Christian living. This course is also a transferable tool designed to create disciple makers by empowering and encouraging everyone who has been discipled using the twelve lessons to become a disciple maker and share them in the same way.

CERTIFICATE OF PASTORAL MINISTRY (CPM)

Program Description

The Certificate of Pastoral Ministry is for pastors currently serving in a church who desire to increase their effectiveness in leading the local congregation and impacting their nation or people group with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Students will direct a revitalization process within their congregation, including forming sequential disciple making small groups, church planting, apprenticing leaders, and teacher training. Students will improve their Bible study skills, sermon preparation and delivery, and learning to teach their whole congregation Bible survey, evangelism, church history, and doctrine. Finally, students will be trained as trainers and serve as part of a team to train a cohort of pastors in these foundational principles.

Program Outcomes

Students who complete the requirements for this program will have met the following objectives:

- 1. Develop skills in Bible study methods, preaching, and teaching
- 2. Learn to revitalize the church to become an intentional disciple making church
- 3. Gain knowledge and skill in directing sequential disciple making small groups
- 4. Experience personal transformation and spiritual formation as a disciple who seeks to make disciples
- 5. Implement an intentional disciple making philosophy of ministry for the local church
- 6. Develop the skills and knowledge required to be an effective pastoral leader
- 7. Multiply ministry by training and developing lay leaders, church planters, and other pastors

BIBLE AND THEOLOGY DIVISION

BT121 Finishing the Great Commission (7 credits)

This course provides a biblical study of the Great Commission and how Jesus made disciples in training phases. Students will learn how to develop revival and reformation in their churches by training disciple making leaders in a model discipleship small group. Students will also learn to lead their churches to increase commitment and financial stewardship.

BT123 Bible Study Methods (8 credits)

In this course, students learn how to study and interpret the Bible correctly. This becomes the basis for how to develop a strong, biblical-based message or lesson. Students also are taught how they can train church members in basic Bible study methods.

BT242 Biblical Disciple Making (7 credits)

In this course, students complete a biblical study of the Gospels to identify the beliefs, values, attitudes, and behaviors that Jesus commanded and expected of His followers at each phase of their spiritual development. Students learn how to develop these transformational indicators into a written sequential definition for making a disciple how to redesign church programming to help form disciples to experience these. Students learn how to facilitate Course 2 for their training center students to train more disciple making leaders and church planters. As facilitators, the students will also help their students effectively recruit students for next-generation training centers.

BT223 Survey of the Old and New Testaments (7 credits)

Students gain an overview of all the Old and New Testament books of the Bible in this course. Students will be taught fifteen books of the Bible in greater depth and receive lesson outlines for every Bible book, including Bible walk-throughs and Bible overviews. Students learn how to facilitate Course 5 to the students attending their training center study groups and coach their training center students on launching new next-generation training centers.

BT224 Survey of Bible Doctrine (5 credits)

Students complete a survey of fourteen Bible doctrines and an overview of church history in this course. Students will learn to preserve unity among Christians who hold diverse views on doctrines not central to the Christian faith. Students will consider how they will approach controversial doctrines such as the woman's role in ministry, the gift of tongues, and the prosperity gospel. Finally, students learn how to facilitate Course 6 to the pastors attending their training center and coach their students to teach Course 2 in a third-generation training center

CHURCH MINISTRIES DIVISION

MINISTRY LEADERSHIP (ML)

ML131 Planting and Multiplying Churches (5 credits)

In this course, students learn strategies for planting churches that can multiply into a church planting movement. Students will also learn how to find persons of peace and plant Discovery Bible Study (DBS) Groups in cultural pockets of people different from your church. Further, students learn to manage a network of Discovery Bible Study "house churches" and transform multiple DBS groups into mid-sized churches.

ML232 Whole-Church Disciple Making (7 credits)

In this course, students learn how to train leaders in their church to lead various small groups to grow disciples sequentially and effectively from spiritual birth to maturity as Christ-followers. Students learn how to mobilize 60% - 95% of their church members into weekly intentional disciple making small groups and use apprentice training to multiply disciple making leaders in their church. Since implementing change is challenging within organizations, students learn how to do so graciously and effectively. Students also learn how to facilitate Course 3 to the pastors attending their training center and coach their church planter apprentices.

PASTORAL MINISTRY (PM)

PM141 Evangelism and World Religions (7 credits)

Students study the doctrine of salvation in this course and explore many common "false gospels." They complete a comparative survey of the dominant religions of the world. Finally, they are introduced to effective evangelism tools and learn to share the gospel with others.

PM243 Growing a Healthy Church (8 credits)

In this course, students will learn church health and growth principles and bring correction and healing to unhealthy church issues. Students learn how to develop a disciple making philosophy of ministry for their church to unify church leaders and focus limited resources. They will learn how to develop a Ministry Community to sustain and disciple their disciple makers. Finally, they will increase their understanding of how to develop new leaders through apprentice training. Students also learn how to facilitate Course 4 to their training center pastors and help students effectively recruit others for next-generation training centers.

SPIRITUAL AND PERSONAL FORMATION (SF)

SF251 Balancing Life and Ministry (8 credits)

In this course, students develop their life mission statement and learn how to fulfill it. They learn the necessity to yield all life areas to God and seek to live a balanced life rather than one driven by ungodly expectations or compulsions. Students learn how to coach church leaders to be fruitful and successful in life and ministry. Students learn how to start a training center study group and facilitate Course 1 for other pastors. In teams of 2-3, students will begin facilitating their next-generation training center study group soon after taking this course. Finally, this course provides instruction on studying narrative material in the Bible and turning this into biblical lessons and sermons.

FIELD MINISTRY DIVISION

FIELD PROJECT (FP)

FP151 Field Project Formation: Local Church Revitalization (1 credit)

The Field Project courses involve application in the local church of what students learn in their study program. The Field Project Formation course covers the first two semesters (8 months) of the program. In addition to initiating new ministry assignments, the student will gather initial data on the local church where they implement ministry. Students will collect contextual information about the religions, cultures, languages, and ethnicities surrounding the church. Initial data from the church will include worship attendance, average financial giving, lay leadership, the number and types of disciple making small groups, and the number of new believers recently added to the church.

FP252 Field Project Implementation in the Local Church (3 credits)

The Field Project Implementation course extends over six semesters (two years). Students will initiate most of the ministry assignments for the program during the Field Project Implementation and record ministry progress. Documented areas include worship attendance, average weekly giving, disciple making leader training, disciple making group multiplication, evangelism results, and Bible study methods training. Students gather additional documentation for Outreach Discovery Bible Study church planting, disciple making curriculum development, philosophy of ministry, total disciple makers in the Ministry Community, and Great Commission expansion results beyond the local church.

FP253 Field Project Report (1 credit)

The Field Project Report documents how well the pastor, staff, and lay leaders have implemented the intentional disciple making principles and actionable steps in the local church. Field Project Report course covers the last two semesters (8 months) of the program. The Field Project Report is presented verbally at the final grading interview. It must include the Final Interview Ministry Data Sheets, the final Vital Signs Annual Report Form, and identify successes and failures in revitalizing the local church as an intentional disciple-making congregation of believers. The report includes an analysis of ministry data collected throughout the three years of implementation with a focus on the seven vital signs for disciple making church revitalization: 1) attendance growth, 2) giving growth, 3) the number of disciple making leaders, 4) the number of disciple making groups, 5) the number of converts, 6) the number of church planting apprentices, and 7) the number of churches planted by the congregation. Students may include data and analysis comparing the Personal Spiritual Journey Evaluation administered to the congregation during the first and ninth terms. Students should also report if and how they contextualized the training to the congregation's ethnicity/culture and surrounding cultures. Finally, the insights learned by the student should be summarized and stated as principles, and the report may include a list of questions for further study.

MINISTRY PRACTICUMS (MP)

Students must learn to accomplish ministry expansion through others rather than their direct efforts in these ministry practicums.

Certificate of Pastoral Ministry

Students must learn to accomplish ministry expansion through others rather than their direct efforts in these two ministry practicums. Students facilitate these ministry practicums within the network of T-Net Training Center study groups. These study groups provide fellowship, student life activity, collaboration, and a consistent schedule to help students complete their learning experience.

Following the biblical pattern of disciples making disciples, students must recruit, mentor, and facilitate a study group of students in a next-generation T-Net Training Center. While taking courses 1-5, the student and others on their T-Net Training Center team recruit next-generation center pastors and church leaders as students. After Course 5, the training center team begins the process with their 1st generation training center class. The 2nd generation training centers start as the first training team take courses 9 and 10. Therefore, this Ministry Practicum aims to help students learn to accomplish more by leading others than through direct ministry involvement.

MP261 Coaching and Supervising a 1st Generation Training Center (6 semesters, C1-6) (3 credit)
MP262 Coaching and Supervising 2nd Generation Training Centers (2 semesters, C1-2) (1 credit)

TEACHING PRACTICUMS (TP)

Certificate of Pastoral Ministry

For these teaching practicums, a student must recruit students from a selected region to join a T-Net Training Center study group. In the teaching practicum, the student will facilitate learning empowered by what the student has learned and implemented in their ministry. Typically, two or three students will form a training team where each student has recruited 5-10 pastors to attend the training center. Students may divide the sessions between them according to how best to facilitate the study group. However, each student is responsible for reviewing and preparing as if they were to facilitate every session. Students have already taught this material to leaders within their churches. However, by facilitating training for their peers (peer-coaching), their learning heightens as they prepare to facilitate the cohort learning experience. Mentors and country directors supervise these training center study groups and their facilitator teams.

Students will learn to lead sequential disciple making small groups. They will launch an outreach small group in their community and multiply new outreach groups by apprenticing new group leaders. From this homegroup network, they will grow their church or may choose to plant a new church. Students will improve their Bible study skills, leadership development, evangelism, Bible teaching, and church organization.

Program Outcomes

Students who complete the requirements for this program will have met the following objectives:

- 1. Experience an intentional disciple making philosophy of ministry for the local church
- 2. Experience personal transformation and spiritual formation as a disciple who seeks to make disciples
- 3. Develop skills in Bible study methods and Bible teaching
- 4. Develop the skills and knowledge required to be an effective pastoral leader
- 5. Gain knowledge and skill in directing sequential disciple making with or within small groups
- 6. Multiply ministry by training and developing lay leaders as group leaders and church planters
- 7. Learn to organize a homegroup network into an intentional disciple making church

BIBLE AND THEOLOGY DIVISION

BT111 Introduction to Finishing the Great Commission (2 credits)

The course defines what finishing the Great Commission looks like and provides a strategy to equip the student to finish it in their lifetime. It also suggests a biblical approach to fund this effort. The course provides a study of the Great Commission and introduces how Jesus made disciples in training phases. Students learn how to train disciple making leaders in a model discipleship small group. Students also learn to lead their churches to increase commitment and financial stewardship. They learn to recruit the next-generation bi-vocational pastors, church planters, and church leaders that the students can train on their own or as part of a training team.

BT122 Bible Study Methods (4 credits)

In this course, students will complete the manual Bible Study Methods manual. Students will learn how to use Bible student methods as the foundation for developing strong, biblical-based messages. They will also learn how to use the Bible Study Methods manual to teach church leaders and church members how to study and interpret the Bible correctly.

BT213 Teaching Survey of Bible and Doctrine (4 credits)

Students will learn how to teach and train others to teach the Bible and doctrine to their congregation using mid-sized group teaching skills in this course. The course introduces various effective teaching methods and provides lesson resources for teaching a survey of Bible books and essential Bible doctrines. As a result of this course, students will become more effective at teaching and have trained small group and mid-sized group leaders to teach essential Bible doctrines and an overview of the whole Bible to their groups.

CHURCH MINISTRIES DIVISION

MINISTRY LEADERSHIP (ML)

ML121 Making and Multiplying Disciples (2 credits)

Students learn how to apprentice lay leaders to become effective small group disciple making leaders and plant house churches. Students will also learn how to find persons of peace and plant Discovery Bible Study Groups in cultural pockets of people different from their church. Further, students learn to manage a network of Discovery Bible Study "house churches" and transform multiple DBS groups into mid-sized churches.

ML212 Church Leader Training (Part 1) (4 credits)

In this course, students will learn to create foundational documents for a church: Purpose Statement, Doctrinal Statement, Target Statement, and Vision Statement. Students will learn practical lessons for disciple making in churches of different sizes and structures. They will learn how to apprentice Outreach Come and See group leaders as potential church planters. Finally, students learn the components of a Be with Me Discovery Bible Study and how to lead one.

ML213 Church Leader Training (Part 2) (4 credits)

In this course, students learn to organize and lead a church. Topics in this course include evangelistic strategies to attract seekers, preventing church splits, multiplying groups, developing a budget, and financial strategy. Additional topics include legal issues, promotional strategy, overcoming attendance drop-off, equipping and empowering leaders, staffing for growth, and launching church plants.

ML214 Sustaining Disciple Makers (4 credits)

The course teaches how to multiply new groups for your whole congregation through apprenticing leaders and how to provide ongoing support for disciple making group leaders through a Ministry Community. Students will experience the workshop, Steps to Freedom in Christ, and learn how to facilitate this for their congregation. Finally, students will learn the principles of church growth.

PASTORAL MINISTRY (PM)

Students will learn and direct revitalization within their congregation, including forming sequential disciple making small groups, training disciple making small group leaders, training Bible teachers, and apprenticing lay leaders to plant house churches. Students will learn Bible study methods, sermon preparation and delivery, Old and New Testament Bible survey, personal evangelism, a survey of world religions, an overview of church history, and a Bible doctrine survey. BIBLE AND THEOLOGY DIVISION

BT321 Finishing the Great Commission (7 credits)

This course provides a biblical study of the Great Commission and how Jesus made disciples in training phases. Students will learn how to develop revival and reformation in their churches by training disciple making leaders in a model discipleship small group. Students will also learn to lead their churches to increase commitment and financial stewardship.

BT323 Bible Study Methods (8 credits)

In this course, students learn how to study and interpret the Bible correctly. This becomes the basis for how to develop a strong, biblical-based message or lesson. Students also are taught how they can train church members in basic Bible study methods.

BT442 Biblical Disciple Making (7 credits)

In this course, students complete a biblical study of the Gospels to identify the beliefs, values, attitudes, and behaviors that Jesus commanded and expected of His followers at each phase of their spiritual development. Students learn how to develop these transformational indicators into a written sequential definition for making a disciple how to redesign church programming to help form disciples to experience these. Students learn how to facilitate Course 2 for their training center students to train more disciple making leaders and church planters. As facilitators, the students will also help their students effectively recruit students for next-generation training centers.

BT423 Survey of the Old and New Testaments (7 credits)

Students gain an overview of all the Old and New Testament books of the Bible in this course. Students will be taught fifteen books of the Bible in greater depth and receive lesson outlines for every Bible book, including Bible walk-throughs and Bible overviews. Students learn how to facilitate Course 5 to the pastors attending their training center study groups and coach their training center students on launching new next-generation training centers.

BT424 Survey of Bible Doctrine (5 credits)

Students complete a survey of fourteen Bible doctrines and an overview of church history in this course. Students will learn to preserve unity among Christians who hold diverse views on doctrines not central to the Christian faith. Students will consider how they will approach controversial doctrines such as the woman's role in ministry, the gift of tongues, and the prosperity gospel. Finally, students learn how to facilitate Course 6 to the pastors attending their training center and coach their students to teach Course 2 in a third-generation training center

CHURCH MINISTRIES DIVISION

MINISTRY LEADERSHIP (ML)

ML331 Planting and Multiplying Churches (5 credits)

Students learn how to apprentice lay leaders to become effective small group disciple making leaders and plant house churches. Students will also learn how to find persons of peace and plant Discovery Bible Study Groups in cultural pockets of people different from their church. Further, students learn to manage a network of Discovery Bible Study "house churches" and transform multiple DBS groups into mid-sized churches.

ML432 Whole-Church Disciple Making (7 credits)

In this course, students learn how to train leaders in their church to lead various small groups to grow disciples sequentially and effectively from spiritual birth to maturity as Christ-followers. Students learn how to mobilize 60% - 95% of their church members into weekly intentional disciple making small groups and use apprentice training to multiply disciple making leaders in their church. Since implementing change is challenging within organizations, students learn how to do so graciously and effectively. Students also learn how to facilitate Course 3 to the pastors attending their training center and coach their church planter apprentices.

PASTORAL MINISTRY (PM)

PM341 Evangelism and World Religions (7 credits)

In this course, students study the doctrine of salvation and explore many common "false gospels." They complete a comparative survey of the dominant religions of the world. Finally, they are introduced to effective evangelism tools and learn to share the gospel with others.

PM443 Growing a Healthy Church (8 credits)

In this course, students will learn church health and growth principles and bring correction and healing to unhealthy church issues. Students learn how to develop a disciple making philosophy of ministry for their church to unify church leaders and focus limited resources. They will learn how to develop a Ministry Community to sustain and disciple their disciple makers. Finally, they will increase their understanding of how to develop new leaders through apprentice training. Students also learn how to facilitate Course 4 to their training center pastors and help students effectively recruit others for next-generation training centers.

SPIRITUAL AND PERSONAL FORMATION (SF)

SF451 Balancing Life and Ministry (8 credits)

In this course, students develop their life mission statement and learn how to fulfill it. They learn the necessity to yield all life areas to God and seek to live a balanced life rather than one driven by ungodly expectations or compulsions. Students learn how to coach church leaders to be fruitful and successful in life and ministry. Students learn how to start a training center study group and facilitate Course 1 for other pastors. In teams of 2-3, students will begin facilitating their next-generation training center study group soon after taking this course. Finally, this course provides instruction on studying narrative material in the Bible and turning this into biblical lessons and sermons.

FIELD MINISTRY DIVISION

FIELD PROJECT (FP)

FP351 Field Project Formation: Local Church Revitalization (1 credit)

The Field Project courses involve application in the local church of what students learn in their study program. The Field Project Formation course covers the first two semesters (8 months) of the program. In addition to initiating new ministry assignments, the student will gather initial data on the local church where they implement ministry. Students will collect contextual information about the religions, cultures, languages, and ethnicities surrounding the church. Initial data from the church will include worship attendance, average financial giving, lay leadership, the number and types of disciple making small groups, and the number of new believers recently added to the church.

FP452 Field Project Implementation in the Local Church (3 credits)

The Field Project Implementation course extends over six semesters (two years). Students will initiate most of the ministry assignments for the program during the Field Project Implementation and record ministry progress. Documented areas include worship attendance, average weekly giving, disciple making leader training, disciple making group multiplication, evangelism results, and Bible study methods training. Students gather additional documentation for Outreach Discovery Bible Study church planting, disciple making curriculum development, philosophy of ministry, total disciple makers in the Ministry Community, and Great Commission expansion results beyond the local church.

FP453 Field Project Report (1 credit)

The Field Project Report documents how well the pastor, staff, and lay leaders have implemented the intentional disciple making principles and actionable steps in the local church. Field Project Report course covers the last two semesters (8 months) of the program. The Field Project Report is presented verbally at the final grading interview. It must include the Final Interview Ministry Data Sheets, the final Vital Signs Annual Report Form, and identify

successes and failures in revitalizing the local church as an intentional disciple-making congregation of believers. The report includes an analysis of ministry data collected throughout the three years of implementation with a focus on the seven vital signs for disciple making church revitalization: 1) attendance growth, 2) giving growth, 3) the number of disciple making leaders, 4) the number of disciple making groups, 5) the number of converts, 6) the number of church planting apprentices, and 7) the number of churches planted by the congregation. Students may include data and analysis comparing the Personal Spiritual Journey Evaluation administered to the congregation during the first and ninth terms. Students should also report if and how they contextualized the training to the congregation's ethnicity/culture and surrounding cultures. Finally, the insights learned by the student should be summarized and stated as principles, and the report may include a list of questions for further study.

MINISTRY PRACTICUMS (MP)

Diploma of Pastoral Ministry (DPM)

Students must learn to accomplish ministry expansion through others rather than their direct efforts in these two ministry practicums. Students facilitate these ministry practicums within the network of T-Net Training Center study groups. These study groups provide fellowship, student life activity, collaboration, and a consistent schedule to help students complete their learning experience.

Following the biblical pattern of disciples making disciples, students must recruit, mentor, and facilitate a study group of students in a next-generation T-Net Training Center. While taking courses 1-5, the student and others on their T-Net Training Center team recruit next-generation center pastors and church leaders as students. After Course 5, the training center team begins the process with their 1st generation training center class. The 2nd generation training centers start as the first training team take courses 9 and 10. Therefore, this Ministry Practicum aims to help students learn to accomplish more by leading others than through direct ministry involvement.

TEACHING PRACTICUMS (TP)

Typically, two or three students will form a training team where each student has recruited 5-10 pastors to attend the training center. Students may divide the sessions between them according to how best to facilitate the study group. However, each student is responsible for reviewing and preparing as if they were to facilitate every session. Students have already taught this material to leaders within their churches. However, by facilitating training for their peers (peer-coaching), their learning heightens as they prepare to facilitate the cohort learning experience. Mentors and country directors supervise these training center study groups and their facilitator teams.

Students gather additional documentation for Outreach Discovery Bible Study church planting, disciple making curriculum development,

philosophy of ministry, total disciple makers in the Ministry Community, and Great Commission expansion results beyond the local church.

FP453 Field Project Report (1 credit)

The Field Project Report documents how well the pastor, staff, and lay leaders have implemented the intentional disciple making principles and actionable steps in the local church. Field Project Report course covers the last two semesters (8 months) of the program. The Field Project Report is typically 15-20 pages and is presented verbally at the final grading interview. It must include the Final Interview Ministry Data Sheets, the final Vital Signs Annual Report Form, and identify successes and failures in revitalizing the local church as an intentional disciple-making congregation of believers. The report includes an analysis of ministry data collected throughout the three years of implementation with a focus on the seven vital signs for disciple making church revitalization: 1) attendance growth, 2) giving growth, 3) the number of disciple making leaders, 4) the number of disciple making groups, 5) the number of converts, 6) the number of church planting apprentices, and 7) the number of churches planted by the congregation. Students may include data and analysis comparing the Personal Spiritual Journey Evaluation administered to the congregation during the first and ninth terms. Students should also report if and how they contextualized the training to the congregation's ethnicity/culture and surrounding cultures. Finally, the insights learned by the student should be summarized and stated as principles, and the report may include a list of questions for further study.

MINISTRY PRACTICUMS (MP)

Students must learn to accomplish ministry expansion through others rather than their direct efforts in these two ministry practicums. Students facilitate these ministry practicums within the network of T-Net Training Center study groups. These study groups provide fellowship, student life activity, collaboration, and a consistent schedule to help students complete their learning experience.

Following the biblical pattern of disciples making disciples, students must recruit, mentor, and facilitate a study group of students in a next-generation T-Net Training Center. While taking courses 1-5, the student and others on their T-Net Training Center team recruit next-generation center pastors and church leaders as students. After Course 5, the training center team begins the process with their 1st generation training center class. The 2nd generation training centers start as the first training team take courses 9 and 10. Therefore, this Ministry Practicum aims to help students learn to accomplish more by leading others than through direct ministry involvement.

MP461 Coaching and Supervising a 1st Generation Training Center (6 semesters, C1-6) (3 credit)
MP462 Coaching and Supervising 2nd Generation Training Centers (2 semesters, C1-2) (1 credit)

TEACHING PRACTICUMS (TP)

For these teaching practicums, a student must recruit students from a selected region to join a T-Net Training Center study group. In the teaching practicum, the student will facilitate learning empowered by what the student has learned and implemented in their ministry. Typically, two or three students will form a training team where each student has recruited 5-10 pastors to attend the training center. Students may divide the sessions between them according to how best to facilitate the study group. However, each student is responsible for reviewing and preparing as if they were to facilitate every session. Students have already taught this material to leaders within their churches. However, by facilitating training for their peers (peer-coaching), their learning heightens as they prepare to facilitate the cohort learning experience. Mentors and country directors supervise these training center study groups and their facilitator teams.

GENERAL STUDIES DIVISION

General studies or general education requirements imply a broad exposure to diverse subject areas from several disciplines. Therefore, students are required to transfer in a core of general studies equivalent to 30 semester hours (45 quarter hours) for a bachelor's degree, with one or more courses drawn from each of the following four disciplines:

- Communication 9 credits (e.g., composition, public speaking, writing courses) 4 credits minimum; typically, 9 credits
- Humanities/Fine Arts 9 credits (e.g., modern and classical languages, history, literature, linguistics, philosophy, archaeology, art, music, graphics) 4 credits minimum; typically, 9 credits
- Natural Science/Mathematics 6 credits (e.g., physical science, biology/life science, physics, chemistry, mathematics, statistics) 4 credits minimum; typically, 6 credits
- Social/Behavioral Sciences 6 credits (e.g., psychology, sociology, anthropology, political science) 4 credits minimum; typically, 6 credits

T-Net International School of Theology - Singapore

Through T-Net International School of Theology (TISOT) – Singapore, Teleo University offers a bachelor's degree program for pastors and church leaders who live outside of the United States and a Graduate Diploma (GDip).

BACHELOR OF PASTORAL MINISTRY (FOR STUDENTS LIVING OUTSIDE OF THE USA)

Program Description

This TISOT Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry (BPM) is designed for pastors living outside of the United States. The program will increase their effectiveness in leading the local congregation to finish the Great Commission and impacting their nation or people group with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Students will direct a process of revitalization within their congregation that includes forming sequential disciple making small groups, church planting, apprenticing leaders, and teacher training. Students will improve their skills in Bible study, sermon preparation and delivery, and learning to teach their whole congregation Bible survey, evangelism, church history, and doctrine. Finally, students will be trained as trainers and will serve as part of a team to train a cohort of pastors in these foundational principles.

Program Outcomes

Students who complete the requirements for this program will have met the following objectives:

- 1. Develop skills in Bible study methods, preaching, and teaching
- 2. Learn to revitalize the church to become an intentional disciple making church
- 3. Gain knowledge and skill in directing sequential disciple making small groups
- 4. Experience personal transformation and spiritual formation as a disciple who seeks to make disciples
- 5. Implement an intentional disciple making philosophy of ministry for the local church
- 6. Develop the skills and knowledge required to be an effective pastoral leader
- 7. Multiply ministry by training and developing lay leaders, church planters, and other pastors

Program Requirements: International Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry

Students must complete a total of 120 semester credits for graduation, where each credit hour represents 40 learning hours or 2,000 minutes of academic engagement for each semester credit.

BIBLE AND THEOLOGY DIVISION

BT321s Finishing the Great Commission (8 credits)

This course provides a biblical study of the Great Commission and how Jesus made disciples in training phases. Students will learn how to develop revival and reformation in their churches by training disciple making leaders in a model discipleship small group. Students will also learn to lead their churches to increase commitment and financial stewardship.

BT323s Bible Study Methods (9 credits)

In this course, students learn how to study and interpret the Bible correctly. This becomes the basis for how to develop a strong, biblical-based message or lesson. Students also are taught how they can train church members in basic Bible study methods.

BT423s Survey of the Old and New Testaments (9 credits)

Students gain an overview of all the Old and New Testament books of the Bible in this course. Students will be taught fifteen books of the Bible in greater depth and receive lesson outlines for every Bible book, including Bible walk-throughs and Bible overviews. Students learn how to facilitate Course 5 to the pastors attending their training center study groups and coach their training center students on launching new next-generation training centers.

BT424s Survey of Bible Doctrine (5 credits)

Students complete a survey of fourteen Bible doctrines and an overview of church history in this course. Students will learn to preserve unity among Christians who hold diverse views on doctrines not central to the Christian faith. Students will consider how they will approach controversial doctrines such as the woman's role in ministry, the gift of tongues, and the prosperity gospel. Finally, students learn how to facilitate Course 6 to the pastors attending their training center and coach their students to teach Course 2 in a third-generation training center.

BT442s Biblical Disciple Making (9 credits)

In this course, students complete a biblical study of the Gospels to identify the beliefs, values, attitudes, and behaviors that Jesus commanded and expected of His followers at each phase of their spiritual development. Students learn how to develop these transformational indicators into a written sequential definition for making a disciple how to redesign church programming to help form disciples to experience these. Students learn how to facilitate Course 2 for their training center students to train more disciple-making leaders and church planters. As facilitators, the students will also help their students effectively recruit students for next-generation training centers.

CHURCH MINISTRIES DIVISION

MINISTRY LEADERSHIP (ML)

ML331s Planting and Multiplying Churches (5 credits)

Students learn how to apprentice lay leaders to become effective small group disciple making leaders and plant house churches. Students will also learn how to find persons of peace and plant Discovery Bible Study Groups in cultural pockets of people different from their church. Further, students learn to manage a network of Discovery Bible Study "house churches" and transform multiple DBS groups into mid-sized churches.

ML432s Whole-Church Disciple Making (8 credits)

In this course, students learn how to train leaders in their church to lead various small groups to grow disciples sequentially and effectively from spiritual birth to maturity as Christ-followers. Students learn how to mobilize 60% - 95% of their church members into weekly intentional disciple making small groups and use apprentice training to multiply disciple making leaders in their church. Since implementing change is challenging within organizations, students learn how to do so graciously and effectively. Students also learn how to facilitate Course 3 to the pastors attending their training center and coach their church planter apprentices.

PASTORAL MINISTRY (PM)

PM341s Evangelism and World Religions (7 credits)

In this course, students study the doctrine of salvation and explore many common "false gospels." They complete a comparative survey of the dominant religions of the world. Finally, they are introduced to effective evangelism tools and learn to share the gospel with others.

PM443s Growing a Healthy Church (11 credits)

In this course, students will learn church health and growth principles and bring correction and healing to unhealthy church issues. Students learn how to develop a disciple making philosophy of ministry for their church to unify church leaders and focus limited resources. They will learn how to develop a Ministry Community to sustain and disciple their disciple makers. Finally, they will increase their understanding of how to develop new leaders through apprentice training. Students also learn how to facilitate Course 4 to their training center pastors and help students effectively recruit others for next-generation training centers.

SPIRITUAL AND PERSONAL FORMATION (SF)

SF451s Balancing Life and Ministry (10 credits)

In this course, students develop their life mission statement and learn how to fulfill it. They learn the necessity to yield all life areas to God and seek to live a balanced life rather than one driven by ungodly expectations or compulsions. Students learn how to coach church leaders to be fruitful and successful in life and ministry. Students learn how to start a training center study group and facilitate Course 1 for other pastors. In teams of 2-3, students will begin facilitating their next-generation training center study group soon after taking this course. Finally, this course provides instruction on studying narrative material in the Bible and turning this into biblical lessons and sermons.

FIELD MINISTRY DIVISION

FIELD PROJECT (FP)

FP351s Field Project Formation: Local Church Revitalization (1 credit)

The Field Project courses involve application in the local church of what students learn in their study program. The Field Project Formation course covers the first two semesters (8 months) of the program. In addition to initiating new ministry assignments, the student will gather initial data on the local church where they implement ministry. Students will collect contextual information about the religions, cultures, languages, and ethnicities surrounding the church. Initial data from the church will include worship attendance, average financial giving, lay leadership, the number and types of disciple making small groups, and the number of new believers recently added to the church.

FP452s Field Project Implementation in the Local Church (3 credits)

The Field Project Implementation course extends over six semesters (two years). Students will initiate most of the ministry assignments for the program during the Field Project Implementation and record ministry progress. Documented areas include worship attendance, average weekly giving, disciple making leader training, disciple making group multiplication, evangelism results, and Bible study methods training. Students gather additional documentation for Outreach Discovery Bible Study church planting, disciple making curriculum development, philosophy of ministry, total disciple makers in the Ministry Community, and Great Commission expansion results beyond the local church.

FP453s Field Project Report (1 credit)

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GRADUATE DIPLOMA OF MINISTRY IN CHURCH GROWTH - SINGAPORE

Program Description

The Teleo University diploma of ministry in church growth provides expertise to those serving full-time in ministry. With its emphasis on church growth and finishing the Great Commission, this program gives special attention to equipping students to oversee the expansion of disciple making training and saturation church planting. Further, to support a lifetime of sustained ministry, students will also experience growth in personal spiritual formation, reading and research methods, cross-cultural engagement, and theologically thinking grounded in biblical study. Teleo University's Graduate Diploma of Ministry in Church Growth requires the prerequisite Diploma of Pastoral Ministry (DPM) or Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry (BPM). In this program, students learn practical principles of church growth. They also apply their learning to a real-life ministry project intended to result in ministry expansion toward finishing the Great Commission in their region and sphere of influence.

Program Outcomes

Students who complete the requirements for this program will have met the following objectives:

- 1. Design and execute a plan using disciple making church saturation to finishing the Great Commission in a specific region
- 2. Write and implement a personal plan to ensure success in both personal life and ministry priorities
- 3. Learn to mentor ministry leaders for personal and professional integrity
- 4. Develop skills for leading, directing, and equipping ministry volunteers and other pastors
- 5. Experience spiritual disciplines to help sustain personal spiritual wellbeing
- 6. Expand ministry by training and developing church planters and other pastors
- Seek to measurably finish the Great Commission within a specified and limited scope through disciple making church saturation
- 8. In a written ministry project, identify and document problems, solutions, principles, and issues that will assist others in finishing the Great Commission within the same or similar cultural context

MINISTRY LEADERSHIP (ML)

ML533 Disciple Making Church Saturation (4 credits)

This course provides an overview of the program and the unique methods of andragogy (adult education) employed in core module education, including maieutic discussions. Students design and initiate a plan for disciple making church saturation in finishing the Great Commission and determine how they will monitor their progress during this course. The course introduces research methods, and students write a description of their projected final ministry project methodology, goals, and plans. Students also learn by facilitating the course "Developing Leaders and Launching Disciple Making Ministries" and supporting other pastors who facilitate "Evangelism and World Religions" to a new generation of disciple making pastors.

ML534 Effective Christian Leadership (4 credits)

This course helps the student learn to apply Christian leadership principles in their ministry context. This course also focuses on the qualities needed in a leader's life. Students will learn from Scripture how to build Christian leadership on godly character and virtues that honor our Savior and the indwelling Holy Spirit of God. Students will also research and write a position paper on the theology of the church. Students will learn by facilitating "Disciple Making Church Saturation" and will guide and support other pastors to facilitate study groups of new generations of disciple making pastors.

ML635 Equipping God's People for Effective Ministry (4 credits)

This course emphasizes the biblical truth that all Christians should use their unique gifts and abilities to serve God in the church and their communities. Jesus entrusted finishing the Great Commission to common men and women, not to the rulers or religious professionals. The Bible identifies uniquely gifted individuals whose role is to equip and release God's people for service and ministry. The course also addresses when and how to restore to ministry those who have sinned and fallen. Students continue to learn by overseeing and supporting others as they facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors and church leaders. Students finalize their ministry project research and document and evaluate the project and identify summary conclusions.

PASTORAL MINISTRY (PM)

PM545 Personal and Ministry Accountability (4 credits)

This course delivers practical and biblical support for providing and receiving supervision and accountability to accomplish ministry goals and tasks. The course emphasizes prayer and ongoing personal spiritual accountability and being accountable for finishing the Great Commission of our Lord Jesus Christ. Students will research crosscultural church planting and write a general introduction and overview of their ministry project. Students continue to learn by facilitating a Bible doctrine course and supporting other students who facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors and church leaders.

PM546 Sustaining Strong Ministry Relationships (4 credits)

This course exposes students to the power of good communication in the context of ministry teams. Students will experience better self-awareness regarding their communication skills and style and learn how to get along with other people better. Conflict is an inevitable part of working as a team. So, students will learn how to manage and resolve conflict biblically. Students will write a research position paper on the theology of finishing the Great Commission and will continue to learn by overseeing and supporting others who facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors.

SPIRITUAL AND PERSONAL FORMATION (SF)

SF552 Life and Ministry Development (4 credits)

This course helps pastors and church planters understand, biblically and practically, balancing life and ministry. Students learn from the study of Scripture that God requires believers to honor Him in all areas of life, not just ministry. Students write a life and ministry development plan and use peer mentoring skills to provide support and accountability. The course also teaches how to identify ministry partners to advance finishing the Great Commission in a particular city or region. Students learn the correct citation of reading and research sources and describe the ministry project's broader cultural context in writing. Students will learn by facilitating the "Managing and Multiplying Disciple Making Churches" course and will guide and support other pastors and church leaders to facilitate study groups for new generations of disciple making leaders.

SF553 Mentoring Ethical Leaders (4 credits)

Based on the power of mentoring and life-on-life development used by Jesus and other characters in the Bible, this course explores the nature and value of mentoring related to the Christian leaders' formation. The course introduces tools for mentors and explores cross-gender mentoring within the context of ministry in varied cultures. Students also learn about ethics in ministry, and each student writes a ministerial code of ethics. Students will research saturation church planting and write a paper describing the specifics of the ministry project context. Students will learn by facilitating the course "How to Teach the Whole Bible to the Whole Congregation" and support other pastors and church leaders that facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors.

SF654 Personal Spiritual Development (4 credits)

This course defines "spiritual formation" and exposes students to many different types of spiritual disciplines. The course presents spiritual disciplines in five categories: inward disciplines, outward disciplines, corporate disciplines, ministry disciplines, and character disciplines. A believer's personal spiritual development is a partnership where God is at work within the believer to bring them into conformity to the image of Christ while the believer is submitting to and cooperating with this work. In their desire to know God and be known by Him, Church history reveals men and women who have developed disciplines that are tremendous tools to cooperate with God's work within the believer. Disciplines give God access, time, and opportunity to transform believers to become more like Jesus. Students will write a research position paper on church planting theology and learn by overseeing and supporting others who facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors.

FIELD MINISTRY DIVISION

FIELD PROJECT (FP)

FP563 Ministry Project Report (2 credits)

Students have designed and implemented a ministry project plan to finish the Great Commission in a specific region using disciple making church saturation throughout the twenty-four months before this final course. They have done so by recruiting and training other pastors in their target region to revitalize their congregations as disciple making churches and employ saturation church planting to ensure that a church is accessible to everyone in the region. At this final core module, the initial focus is on students reporting their ministry projects' results. Students write and present a ministry project summary report. This 10-15 page summary report allows time for presentation, discussion, and collaboration between the cohort members. Students also continue to learn by overseeing and supporting others to facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors.

T-NET GRADUATE SCHOOL OF MINISTRY

The school offers graduate degree programs for pastors and church leaders who seek to increase their effectiveness in impacting their nation or people group with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

MASTER OF MINISTRY IN CHURCH GROWTH (MMIN)

Program Description

The Teleo University master of ministry degree provides expertise to those serving full-time in ministry. With its emphasis on church growth and finishing the Great Commission, this program gives special attention to equipping students to oversee the expansion of disciple making training and saturation church planting. Further, to support a lifetime of sustained ministry, students will also experience growth in personal spiritual formation, reading and research methods, cross-cultural engagement, and theologically thinking grounded in biblical study. Teleo University's master of ministry degree requires the prerequisite Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry (BPM) degree. In this program, students learn practical principles of church growth. They also apply their learning to a real-life ministry project intended to result in ministry expansion toward finishing the Great Commission in their region and sphere of influence.

Program Outcomes

Students who complete the requirements for this program will have met the following objectives:

- 1. Design and execute a plan using disciple making church saturation to finishing the Great Commission in a specific region
- 2. Write and implement a personal plan to ensure success in both personal life and ministry priorities
- 3. Learn to mentor ministry leaders for personal and professional integrity
- 4. Develop skills for leading, directing, and equipping ministry volunteers and other pastors
- 5. Experience spiritual disciplines to help sustain personal spiritual wellbeing
- 6. Expand ministry by training and developing church planters and other pastors
- Seek to measurably finish the Great Commission within a specified and limited scope through disciple making church saturation
- 8. In a written ministry project, identify and document problems, solutions, principles, and issues that will assist others in finishing the Great Commission within the same or similar cultural context

FIELD MINISTRY DIVISION

FIELD PROJECT (FP)

FP663 Ministry Project Thesis (4 credits)

Students have designed and implemented a ministry project plan to finish the Great Commission in a specific region using disciple making church saturation throughout the twenty-four months before this final course. They have done so by recruiting and training other pastors in their target region to revitalize their congregations as disciple making churches and employ saturation church planting to ensure that a church is accessible to everyone in the region. At this final core module, the initial focus is on students reporting their ministry projects' results. First, students write and present a ministry project summary report. This 10-15 page summary report allows time for presentation, discussion, and collaboration between the cohort members. Students then cluster in triads to verbally present their ministry project thesis for peer review. After submitting a draft of their complete thesis for final editing and review by the university faculty and staff, the student completes a verbal presentation to a faculty committee. The student will then make any final changes required by the committee before submitting the final draft. Students also continue to learn by overseeing and supporting others to facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors.

MASTER OF DIVINITY (MDIV)

Program Description

Students will direct revitalization within their congregation in the Master of Divinity (MDiv) program, including forming sequential disciple making small groups, church planting, apprenticing leaders, and teacher training. Students will consider all the options for organizing a local church and why various options may be more effective. Students will evaluate why churches struggle with change, conflict, outreach, new members' assimilation, commitment to spiritual growth, and developing lay leaders. Students will improve their Bible study skills, sermon preparation and delivery, and learning to teach their whole congregation Bible survey, evangelism, church history, and doctrine. Finally, students will be trained as trainers and serve as part of a team to train a cohort of pastors in these foundational principles.

Program Outcomes

Students who complete the requirements for this program will have met the following objectives:

- 1. Develop skills in Bible study methods, preaching, and teaching
- 2. Learn to revitalize the church to become an intentional disciple making church
- 3. Gain knowledge and expertise in directing sequential disciple making small groups
- 4. Experience personal transformation and spiritual formation as a disciple who seeks to make disciples
- 5. Implement an intentional disciple making philosophy of ministry for the local church
- 6. Develop the skills and knowledge required to be an effective pastoral leader
- 7. Multiply ministry by training and developing lay leaders, church planters, and other pastors

BIBLE AND THEOLOGY DIVISION

BT521 Finishing the Great Commission (7 credits)

In this course, students learn how to finish the Great Commission in their lifetime. The course defines what finishing the Great Commission looks like and provides a strategy to equip students to finish it in their lifetime. It also suggests a biblical approach to fund this effort. The course offers a study of the Great Commission and introduces how Jesus made disciples in training phases. Students will learn how to develop revival and reformation in their churches by training disciple making leaders in a model discipleship small group. Students will also learn to lead their churches to increase commitment and financial stewardship and recruit the next-generation of pastors for training center multiplication that will take place within two years.

BT523 Bible Study Methods and Sermon Preparation (8 credits)

In this course, students learn how to teach church leaders and pastors in training how to study and interpret the Bible correctly; how to develop a robust and biblical-based message or lesson. Students also learn how to train the congregation in basic Bible study methods using a twenty-session training course.

BT623 How to Teach the Whole Bible to the Whole Congregation (7 credits)

In this course, students learn how to teach all the Old and New Testament books of the Bible to every person in their congregation by training their small group and mid-sized group leaders to teach Bible overview lessons. Students will be taught fifteen books of the Bible and receive lesson outlines for every book of the Bible, including Bible walk-throughs and Bible overviews for their teachers to use. Students learn how to facilitate Course 5 to the pastors attending their training center study groups and coach their training center students on launching new next-generation training centers.

BT624 How to Teach Bible Doctrine to the Whole Congregation (5 credits)

In this course, students learn how to teach a survey of Bible doctrines to other pastors and everyone in their church. Students learn how to facilitate Course 6 to the pastors attending their training center and coach their students to teach Course 2 in a third-generation training center. Students receive additional training on how to sustain a multiplication of church planter apprenticing.

CHURCH MINISTRIES DIVISION

MINISTRY LEADERSHIP (ML)

ML531 Apprenticing Disciple Makers and Church Planters (5 credits)

Students learn how to apprentice lay leaders to become effective small group disciple making leaders and plant house churches. Students will also learn how to find persons of peace and plant Discovery Bible Study Groups in cultural pockets of people different from their church. Further, students learn to manage a network of Discovery Bible Study "house churches" and transform multiple DBS groups into mid-sized churches.

ML632 Developing Leaders and Launching Ministries (7 credits)

In this course, students learn how to train leaders in their church to lead various small groups to grow disciples sequentially and effectively from spiritual birth to maturity as Christ-followers. Students learn how to mobilize 60% - 95% of their church members into weekly intentional disciple making small groups and use apprentice training to

multiply disciple making leaders in their church. Since implementing change is challenging within organizations, students learn how to do so graciously and effectively. Students also learn how to facilitate Course 3 to the pastors attending their training center and coach their church planter apprentices.

PASTORAL MINISTRY (PM)

PM541 Evangelism and World Religions (7 credits)

In this course, students complete an in-depth study on the doctrine of salvation and explore many "false gospels." They then learn how to train others in the doctrine of salvation and complete a comparative survey of the world's dominant religions. They are introduced to practical evangelism tools to help the student's church members effectively share the gospel with others. Pastors learn how to train their leaders to start evangelistic small groups and disciple new converts using different curriculum options. Finally, students learn how to prepare to begin their pastor training centers.

PM642 Foundations for a Disciple Making Church (7 credits)

In this course, students learn how to develop a written sequential definition for making a disciple from the Bible and redesign their church programming to help form disciples who grow through these levels of spiritual maturity. Students will begin to understand the way God has designed the church to grow and how to use the church correctly in disciple making. Students learn how to facilitate Course 2 for their training center students to train more disciplemaking leaders and church planters. As facilitators, the students will also help their students effectively recruit students for next-generation training centers.

PM643 Managing and Multiplying Disciple Making Churches (8 credits)

In this course, students will learn the principles of church health and growth and bring correction and healing to unhealthy church issues. Students learn how to develop a disciple making philosophy of ministry for their church to unify church leaders and focus limited resources. They will learn how to develop a Ministry Community to sustain and disciple their disciple makers. Finally, they will increase their understanding of how to develop new leaders through apprentice training. Students also learn how to facilitate Course 4 to their training center pastors and help students effectively recruit others for next-generation training centers.

SPIRITUAL AND PERSONAL FORMATION (SF)

SF651 Coaching Leaders and Multiplying Ministry (8 credits)

In this course, students develop their life mission statement and learn how to fulfill it. They learn the necessity to yield all life areas to God and seek to live a balanced life rather than one driven by ungodly expectations or compulsions. Students learn how to coach church leaders to be fruitful and successful in life and ministry. Students learn how to start a training center study group and facilitate Course 1 for other pastors. In teams of 2-3, students will begin facilitating their next-generation training center study group soon after taking this course. Finally, this course provides instruction on studying narrative material in the Bible and turning this into biblical lessons and sermons.

FIELD MINISTRY DIVISION

FIELD PROJECT (FP)

FP551 Field Project Formation: Local Church Revitalization (1 credit)

The Field Project courses involve application in the local church of what students learn in their study program. The Field Project Formation course covers the first two semesters (8 months) of the program. In addition to initiating new ministry assignments, the student will gather initial data on the local church where they implement ministry. Students will collect contextual information about the religions, cultures, languages, and ethnicities surrounding the church. Initial data from the church will include worship attendance, average financial giving, lay leadership, the number and types of disciple making small groups, and the number of new believers recently added to the church.

FP652 Field Project Implementation in the Local Church (3 credits)

The Field Project Implementation course extends over six semesters (two years). Students will initiate most of the ministry assignments for the program during the Field Project Implementation and record ministry progress. Documented areas include worship attendance, average weekly giving, disciple making leader training, disciple making group multiplication, evangelism results, and Bible study methods training. Students gather additional documentation for Outreach Discovery Bible Study church planting, disciple making curriculum development, philosophy of ministry, total disciple makers in the Ministry Community, and Great Commission expansion results beyond the local church.

FP653 Field Project Report (1 credit)

The Field Project Report documents how well the pastor, staff, and lay leaders have implemented the intentional disciple making principles and actionable steps in the local church. Field Project Report course covers the last two semesters (8 months) of the program. The Field Project Report is typically 15-20 pages and is presented verbally at the final grading interview. It must include the Final Interview Ministry Data Sheets, the final Vital Signs Annual Report Form, and identify successes and failures in revitalizing the local church as an intentional disciple-making congregation of believers. The report includes an analysis of ministry data collected throughout the three years of implementation with a focus on the seven vital signs for disciple making church revitalization: 1) attendance growth,

2) giving growth, 3) the number of disciple making leaders, 4) the number of disciple making groups, 5) the number of converts, 6) the number of church planting apprentices, and 7) the number of churches planted by the congregation. Students may include data and analysis comparing the Personal Spiritual Journey Evaluation administered to the congregation during the first and ninth terms. Students should also report if and how they contextualized the training to the congregation's ethnicity/culture and surrounding cultures. Finally, the insights learned by the student should be summarized and stated as principles, and the report may include a list of questions for further study.

MINISTRY PRACTICUMS (MP)

Master of Divinity (MDiv)

Students must learn to accomplish ministry expansion through others rather than their direct efforts in these two ministry practicums. Students facilitate these ministry practicums within the network of T-Net Training Center study groups. These study groups provide fellowship, student life activity, collaboration, and a consistent schedule to help students complete their learning experience.

Following the biblical pattern of disciples making disciples, students must recruit, mentor, and facilitate a study group of students in a next-generation T-Net Training Center. While taking courses 1-5, the student and others on their T-Net Training Center team recruit next-generation center pastors and church leaders as students. After Course 5, the training center team begins the process with their 1st generation training center class. The 2nd generation training centers start as the first training team take courses 9 and 10. Therefore, this Ministry Practicum aims to help students learn to accomplish more by leading others than through direct ministry involvement.

MP661 Coaching and Supervising a 1st Generation Training Center (6 semesters, C1-6) (5 credit) MP662 Coaching and Supervising 2nd Generation Training Centers (2 semesters, C1-2) (1 credit)

TEACHING PRACTICUMS (TP)

Master of Divinity (MDiv)

For these teaching practicums, a student must recruit students from a selected region to join a T-Net Training Center study group. In the teaching practicum, the student will facilitate learning empowered by what the student has learned and implemented in their ministry. Typically, two or three students will form a training team where each student has recruited 5-10 pastors to attend the training center. Students may divide the sessions between them according to how best to facilitate the study group. However, each student is responsible for reviewing and preparing as if they were to facilitate every session. Students have already taught this material to leaders within their churches. However, by facilitating training for their peers (peer-coaching), their learning heightens as they prepare to facilitate the cohort learning experience. Mentors and country directors supervise these training center study groups and their facilitator teams.

DOCTOR OF MINISTRY (DMIN)

Program Description

The Teleo University Doctor of Ministry degree is a terminal degree designed to provide expertise to those serving full-time in ministry. With its emphasis on church growth and finishing the Great Commission, this program gives special attention to equipping students to oversee the expansion of disciple making training and saturation church planting. Further, to support a lifetime of sustained ministry, students will also experience growth in personal spiritual formation, reading and research methods, cross-cultural engagement, and theologically thinking grounded in biblical study. Teleo University's Doctor of Ministry degree requires a Master of Divinity equivalent and a minimum of three years of active ministry experience. The prerequisite Master of Arts in Pastoral Ministry degree satisfies this requirement. In this program, students learn practical principles of church growth. They also apply their learning to a real-life ministry project intended to result in ministry expansion toward finishing the Great Commission in their region and sphere of influence.

Program Outcomes

Students who complete the requirements for this program will have met the following objectives:

- 1. Design and execute a plan using disciple making church saturation to finishing the Great Commission in a specific region
- 2. Write and implement a personal plan to ensure success in both personal life and ministry priorities
- 3. Learn to mentor ministry leaders for personal and professional integrity
- 4. Develop skills for leading, directing, and equipping ministry volunteers and other pastors
- 5. Experience spiritual disciplines to help sustain personal spiritual wellbeing
- 6. Expand ministry by training and developing church planters and other pastors
- 7. Seek to measurably finish the Great Commission within a specified and limited scope through disciple making church saturation
- 8. In a written ministry project, identify and document problems, solutions, principles, and issues that will assist others in finishing the Great Commission within the same or similar cultural context

- 2. Continued involvement as an active facilitator for a T-Net Training Center (study group).
- 3. Successful completion of the Teleo University Master of Divinity degree.

Graduation Requirements

The Professional Doctor of Ministry degree prepares the graduate as a leader of leaders in denominational and parachurch agencies and as a trainer of Christian ministry. The student passes an assessment of his or her achievement of the graduate profile for this award, including:

- 1. Successful completion of 45 credit hours inclusive of a ministry project dissertation.
- 2. Completion and defense of a Ministry Project dissertation of approximately 50,000 words.
- 3. Writing and presenting a Ministry Project Summary Report for Peer Review.
- 4. Ministry involvement in training, equipping, mentoring, and coaching ministry leaders.
 - Completion of eight Teaching Practicums
 - Completion of a Ministry Practicum in Mentoring Leaders
 - Coaching and Overseeing Ministry Multiplication to 2nd and 3rd Generation Training Centers
- . Model of the Student Life Character and Conduct and mastery of the Institutional Learning Outcomes.

- 6. Recognized and experienced practitioners in Christian ministry, commended for faithful discipleship and leadership, and who have demonstrated the following qualities through appropriate examination and peer-level professional review:
 - Comprehensive understanding, having demonstrated a breadth of systematic understanding of church growth through disciple making leadership multiplication and saturation church planting toward finishing the Great Commission in a specific region.
 - Critical skills, demonstrating their capacity for independent evaluation of primary and secondary source
 materials to integrate academic knowledge, combined with biblical faithfulness, resulting in improved
 ministry practice.
 - Serious inquiry with integrity, demonstrating the ability to implement a substantial ministry project using
 research into, and critical analysis of, current and previous professional practice, and ability to generate
 mutual critique with thinkers and practitioners from outside their immediate ministry context, resulting in
 culturally contextualized principles and coherent insights presented with scholarly integrity in the ministry
 project dissertation.
 - Creative and original contribution, having produced an original contribution that a) extends knowledge
 and insight into finishing the Great Commission in a particular geographic and cultural context, b) generates
 new perspectives, approaches or paradigms in evangelism, disciple making, leadership development, and
 saturation church planting, and c) enhances the integration between theological reflection and Christian
 ministry practice.
 - Contextual relevance, having shown their capacity for biblically informed critical engagement to multiply disciple making churches to finish the Great Commission within the realities of their cultural contexts.
 - Ability to communicate, having shown an ability in communicating about their area of expertise to peer-level academic and professional audiences. Where appropriate, this communication should also be made accessible to non-specialists in local Christian communities in culturally relevant ways through teaching, preaching, or writing.
 - Missional impact, having shown that they are committed to using the fruit of their doctoral study to promote
 the kingdom of God and advance the mission of the church (both local and global) to finish the Great
 Commission of Jesus Christ through culturally appropriate reformulation of theory and professional practice,
 to the glory of God.

Program Structure and Delivery

Students participate in this program year-round by completing three 16-week terms each year for 10 terms. Students are independent learners but participate in regularly scheduled study groups called T-Net Training Centers led by experienced facilitators.

CHURCH MINISTRIES DIVISION MINISTRY LEADERSHIP (ML)

ML733 Disciple Making Church Saturation (5 credits)

This course provides an overview of the program and the unique methods of andragogy (adult education) employed in core module education, including maieutic discussions. Students design and initiate a plan for disciple making church saturation in finishing the Great Commission and determine how they will monitor their progress during this course. The course introduces research methods, and students write a description of their projected final ministry project methodology, goals, and plans. Students also learn by facilitating the course "Developing Leaders and Launching Disciple Making Ministries" and supporting other pastors who facilitate "Evangelism and World Religions" to a new generation of disciple making pastors.

ML734 Effective Christian Leadership (5 credits)

This course helps the student learn to apply Christian leadership principles in their ministry context. This course also focuses on the qualities needed in a leader's life. Students will learn from Scripture how to build Christian leadership on godly character and virtues that honor our Savior and the indwelling Holy Spirit of God. Students will also research

and write a position paper on the theology of the church. Students will learn by facilitating "Disciple Making Church Saturation" and will guide and support other pastors to facilitate study groups of new generations of disciple making pastors.

ML735 Equipping God's People for Effective Ministry (5 credits)

This course emphasizes the biblical truth that all Christians should use their unique gifts and abilities to serve God in the church and their communities. Jesus entrusted finishing the Great Commission to common men and women, not to the rulers or religious professionals. The Bible identifies uniquely gifted individuals whose role is to equip and release God's people for service and ministry. The course also addresses when and how to restore to ministry those who have sinned and fallen. Students continue to learn by overseeing and supporting others as they facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors and church leaders. Students finalize their ministry project research and document and evaluate the project and identify summary conclusions.

PASTORAL MINISTRY (PM)

PM745 Personal and Ministry Accountability (5 credits)

This course delivers practical and biblical support for providing and receiving supervision and accountability to accomplish ministry goals and tasks. The course emphasizes prayer and ongoing personal spiritual accountability and being accountable for finishing the Great Commission of our Lord Jesus Christ. Students will research crosscultural church planting and write a general introduction and overview of their ministry project. Students continue to learn by facilitating a Bible doctrine course and supporting other students who facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors and church leaders.

PM746 Sustaining Strong Ministry Relationships (5 credits)

This course exposes students to the power of good communication in the context of ministry teams. Students will experience better self-awareness regarding their communication skills and style and learn how to get along with other people better. Conflict is an inevitable part of working as a team. So, students will learn how to manage and resolve conflict biblically. Students will write a research position paper on the theology of finishing the Great Commission and will continue to learn by overseeing and supporting others who facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors.

SPIRITUAL AND PERSONAL FORMATION (SF)

SF752 Life and Ministry Development (5 credits)

This course helps pastors and church planters understand, biblically and practically, balancing life and ministry. Students learn from the study of Scripture that God requires believers to honor Him in all areas of life, not just ministry. Students write a life and ministry development plan and use peer mentoring skills to provide support and accountability. The course also teaches how to identify ministry partners to advance finishing the Great Commission in a particular city or region. Students learn the correct citation of reading and research sources and describe the ministry project's broader cultural context in writing. Students will learn by facilitating the "Managing and Multiplying Disciple Making Churches" course and will guide and support other pastors and church leaders to facilitate study groups for new generations of disciple making leaders.

SF753 Mentoring Ethical Leaders (5 credits)

Based on the power of mentoring and life-on-life development used by Jesus and other characters in the Bible, this course explores the nature and value of mentoring related to the Christian leaders' formation. The course introduces tools for mentors and explores cross-gender mentoring within the context of ministry in varied cultures. Students also learn about ethics in ministry, and each student writes a ministerial code of ethics. Students will research saturation church planting and write a paper describing the specifics of the ministry project context. Students will learn by facilitating the course "How to Teach the Whole Bible to the Whole Congregation" and support other pastors and church leaders that facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors.

SF754 Personal Spiritual Development (5 credits)

This course defines "spiritual formation" and exposes students to many different types of spiritual disciplines. The course presents spiritual disciplines in five categories: inward disciplines, outward disciplines, corporate disciplines, ministry disciplines, and character disciplines. A believer's personal spiritual development is a partnership where God is at work within the believer to bring them into conformity to the image of Christ while the believer is submitting to and cooperating with this work. In their desire to know God and be known by Him, Church history reveals men and women who have developed disciplines that are tremendous tools to cooperate with God's work within the believer. Disciplines give God access, time, and opportunity to transform believers to become more like Jesus. Students will write a research position paper on church planting theology and learn by overseeing and supporting others who facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors.

FIELD MINISTRY DIVISION

FIELD PROJECT (FP)

FP863 Ministry Project Dissertation (5 credits)

Students have designed and implemented a ministry project plan to finish the Great Commission in a specific region using disciple making church saturation throughout the twenty-four months before this final course. They have done so by recruiting and training other pastors in their target region to revitalize their congregations as disciple making churches and employ saturation church planting to ensure that a church is accessible to everyone in the region. At this final core module, the initial focus is on students reporting their ministry projects' results. First, students write and present a ministry project summary report. This 10-15 page summary report allows time for presentation, discussion, and collaboration between the cohort members. Students then cluster in triads to verbally present their ministry project thesis for peer review. After submitting a draft of their entire thesis for final editing and review by the university faculty and staff, the student completes a verbal presentation to a faculty committee. The student will then make any final changes required by the committee before submitting the final draft. Students also continue to learn by overseeing and supporting others to facilitate learning for new generations of disciple making pastors.
